MORE SOLDIERS.—Word has been received at Halifax that a contingent of soldiers will arrive about the end of the month to strengthen the various corps on that station. The number coming for each is as follows: Royal Engineers, 50 men; Royal Artillery, 60 men; Leicestershire regiment, 80 men.

A reward of fifty dollars is offered for their arrest.

SEIZED FOR SMUGGING.—A schooner from St. John's, with no name, has been seized at Glace Bay for smuggling. She ran in there for shelter in the first instance, but began landing her cargo, which consisted of eighty-three cases of whiskey, a dozen packages of rum, and a quantity of tobacco. The contraband goods were captured and the vessel towed to North Sydney.

FROM HALIFAX.—The steamer Premier arrived here from Halifax via intermediate ports about seven o'clock last evening, having a general cargo and several passengers. About midnight she proceeded to Summerside with freight and one passenger—William A. Lefurgey. She returns to Charlottetown this afternoon about 4 o'clock, and after taking freight will proceed to Halifax.

THE HALIFAX BOSTON ROUTE.—The Canada Atlantic Steamship Company have cleared arrangements with General Plant, the principal owner of the Plant Railway and Steamship Line, for the routing of the steamer Olivette in connection with the steamer Halifax, forming a tri-weekly service between Boston and Halifax. The tri-weekly service will begin June 25th, the boats leaving Halifax and Boston every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

NOVA SCOTIA GOLD.—The Halifax Herald says: James Thompson brought in from the Eastville gold mine, Mount Urlick, a wedge of gold 200 ounces, the product of a washing of 24 tons of quartz. The Bridgewater Bulletin says: G. A. Wade deposited a brick of gold weighing 210 ounces with the Merchant's Bank last week. The Boston Gold Mining Company also deposited a brick with the Halifax Banking Company last week, weighing 175 ounces, the result of ten days' work.

DIED. At Charlottetown, on Friday, 13th inst., Michael Trainor, in his 70th year, a native of County Monaghan, Ireland.

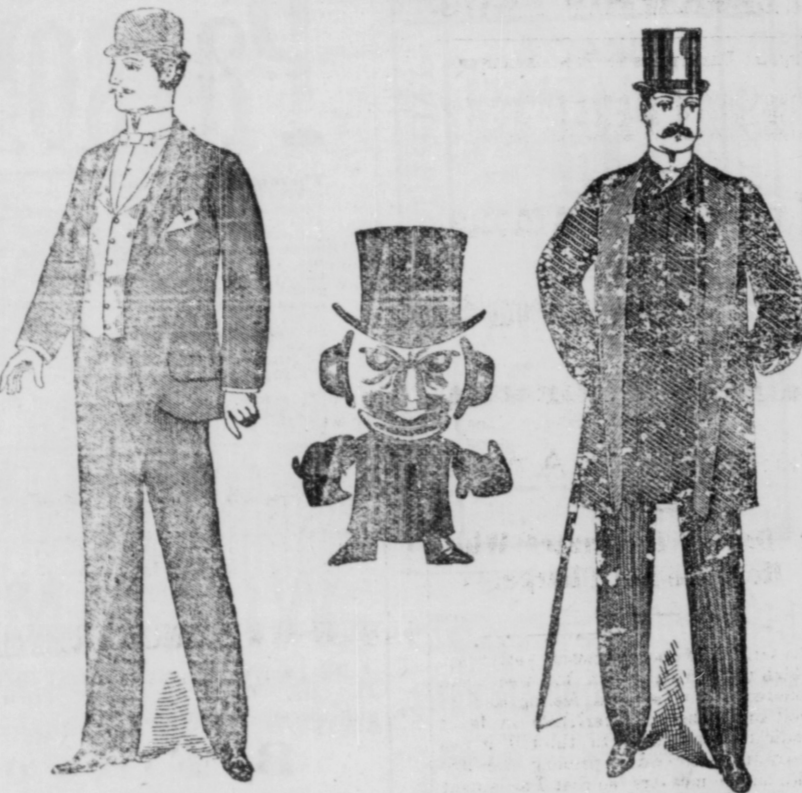
