The "Scott Law."

LAST fall we mentioned that Ohio had a Legislative enactment called the Scott Law, which provided for a heavy license fee for liquor selling. The law has worked so well in Ohio, in reducing the Municipal taxation, in consequence of the large sums paid for license by liquor sellers, that other States are adopting the principle. Illinois has already passed a high license law which goes into effect in April. It provides that the sellers of spirituous liquors shall pay a \$500 license, and \$150 is the price of license for the sale of malt liquors. It is thought, however, that there is great likelihood that the keepers of beer saloons will sell spirituous liquors, and an attempt is being made to amend the law so as to make all licenses \$500. New York State will also, very probably, adopt high license. A Bill to that effect is now before the Legislature in Session at Albany. Henry Ward Beecher is a strenuous advocate of the measure. He and others believe that it is impossible, in the present state of public opinion in all the large States to pass optional or prohibitory laws, and that only high license will curtail the traffic in strong drinks. The Scott Law has reduced the number of liquor stores 4,500 in Ohio, and in a short time has
