

**New Exhibition
Opens At Centre**

Tuesday night an exhibition of the best in Canadian art was opened by Lt. Governor W.J. MacDonald at a formal ceremony in Charlottetown. The collection is entitled "The Royal Canadian Academy In Retrospect" and Academy President Harold Beament and Vice President A.T. Galt Burnford both of Montreal, were present for the occasion.

There are 74 paintings by 49 artists in the collection, and subject matter is varied. Already the heavy summer influx of visitors has begun in the gallery, reaching a high point on Sunday with an attendance of 800 people. The Royal Canadian Academy and no new date has been set. **Charlottetown Man Is
Conference Delegate**

According to information released by the Canadian Catholic Conference, John Eldon Green of Charlottetown has been named as a member of the Canadian delegation to attend the Third World Congress of the Lay Apostolate to be held in Rome in 1967.

The Canadian delegation will number 30 persons, and will include English, French and Ukrainian representatives. Mr. Green will attend a meeting of the North American delegates to be held in Washington, D.C. in October where reports will be prepared on three basic themes: Mobility, Crisis of Faith, Poverty and the Church; Laymen in the Structures of the Church.

Mr. Green is married to the former Mary Sigsworth of Charlottetown who expects to accompany him to Rome. Questioned about the Congress, Mr. Green expressed appreciation for the recognition extended to him by the Canadian Bishops and stated that he is looking forward to the World Congress as a unique opportunity for someone from this province to participate in "the dramatic new developments in the Church following the recently completed Vatican Council."

Receives Post**

ALBERTON - Group Captain Arthur F. Green, DFC, AFC, a native of Alberton, has been appointed senior Air Liaison Officer at the Canadian Defense Staff in London, England. Group Captain Green, youngest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Arthur C. Green, was born in Alberton in 1917. He received his education at Alberton High School and Prince of Wales College, after which he taught school in this province. He joined the RCAF at Charlottetown in 1941 and was commissioned as a pilot the following year. He served overseas for four and a half years, rendering outstanding service with the Pathfinders. He was awarded the Air Force Cross in 1944 and the Distinguished Flying Cross in 1945. Since the war he has served at Rockcliffe RCAF Station, at the National Defense College in Kingston and at Goose Bay, Labrador. After attending the USAF Air War College at Maxwell Air Force Base in Alabama, he was assigned to exchange duty in Britain as a member of the directing staff of the RAF Staff College at Brecknell. For the past four years he has been serving at Canadian Forces Headquarters in Ottawa. In 1963 he was appointed director of air policy. Group Captain Green is married to the former Jean Hallam of Leicester, England. They have three children, Karen, Bruce, and Peter.
