Leaving Scene Of Accident Case Adjudged To May 10

Sidney MacQuarrie, city, charged with leaving the scene of an accident had his case adjudged to May 10 when he appeared in city police court yesterday morning before Magistrate A. James Haslam, QC. Lester O'Donnell acted as counsel for the accused.

Louis Henry Gaudet, Parkdale, charged with failing to stop at a red traffic light, was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Herbert Rodney Coles, Milton, charged with driving a motor vehicle the wrong way on a one-way street, was fined \$5 and costs or two days.

Five men were arraigned on charges of being drunk and incapable; one accused was fined \$25 and costs or 20 days, three were given 20 day suspended sentences, while the fifth was remanded to Wednesday, May 4.

Making Threats Case Is Heard

SUMMERSIDE — A town resident, Joseph Frank Somier, appeared in town court yesterday morning before Magistrate Richard Hilton, QC, on a charge of making threats. The accused was to enter into a recognizance of \$200 and was to keep the peace for one year and to refrain from alcoholic beverages.

2 Indictments Docketed In Court At Georgetown

GEORGETOWN — A sitting of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island, for Kings County, opened at Georgetown yesterday, with Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan presiding. Two bills of indictment were before the court: The Queen vs. John Charles Martell of Georgetown, charged with breaking and entering the residence of Dennis Mossman of Souris and committing the indictable offence of assault. The Crown was represented by J. Arthur McGuigan, QC, deputy attorney general. Martell was not represented by counsel.

The Grand Jury found a true bill on the indictment. Martell will not be arraigned until 10:30 a.m. on May 5th, when it is expected that the court will have appointed counsel to represent him.

The other case on the docket was the Queen vs. Ernest Owen Roach of Georgetown, charged with breaking and entering the residence of Quentin Mossman of Souris and committing the indictable offence of mischief by damage to property. The Crown was represented by the deputy attorney general and the accused by D.F. Sigsworth. The jury found a true bill in this case. The accused was arraigned and pleaded not guilty and his trial was set for Wednesday, May 4th, at 11 a.m.

Judge MacGuigan addressed the Grand Jury and read the bills of indictment to them. He further instructed them on their duties, including the inspection of the court house building and jail.

J. Arthur McGuigan, QC, deputy attorney general, made a motion that Harold M. Smith, retired bank manager of Montague be appointed a commissioner for taking affidavits in the Supreme Court for the three counties. The motion was granted.

Following is the Grand Jury report: "We, the Grand Jury, beg to submit our report of our inspection of the court house and jail as follows:

"The exterior of the building appears to be in very good condition, with the following exceptions (a) New eaves-troughs and down-spouts required; (b) New steps from the jail into the jail-yard required.

"The following repairs should be done in the interior of the court house and jail: (a) All ceilings and walls should be repaired; (b) A new ceiling is required in the judge's chambers; (c) The table in the jury room requires repairs to top; (d) new

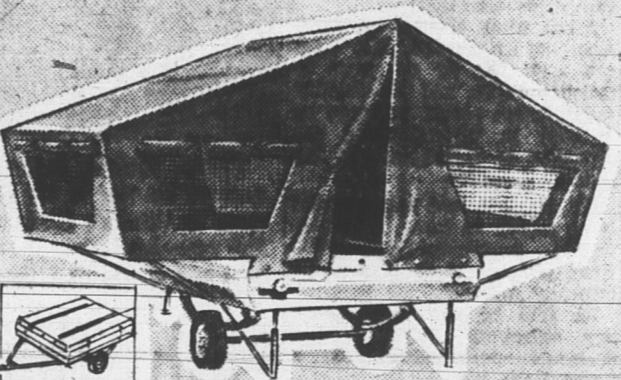

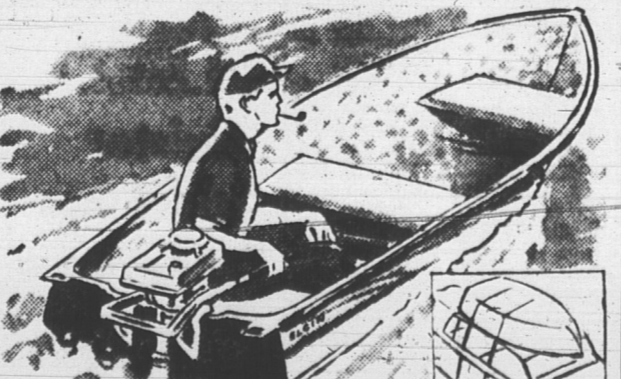

Destroyer Due Today

The HMCS Saguenay, namesake of the first destroyer ever built for the Royal Canadian Navy, under the command of Capt. Henry H.W. Plant, CD,

will arrive on the railway wharf in Charlottetown at noon today.

The sleek helicopter-equipped destroyer escort is currently enroute back to her home base in Halifax following a week's cruise up the Saguenay River, after which the ship is named. Local naval officials have advised that word has been received from Cmdr Plant that the Saguenay will be open for public inspection from 2 to 5 p.m. Wednesday afternoon and members of the ship's company will be available to take groups on conducted tours.

The ship is scheduled to depart from Charlottetown Thursday at 8:30 a.m. to continue her voyage to Halifax.

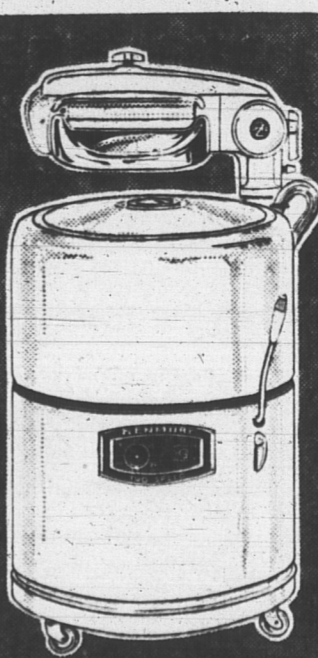

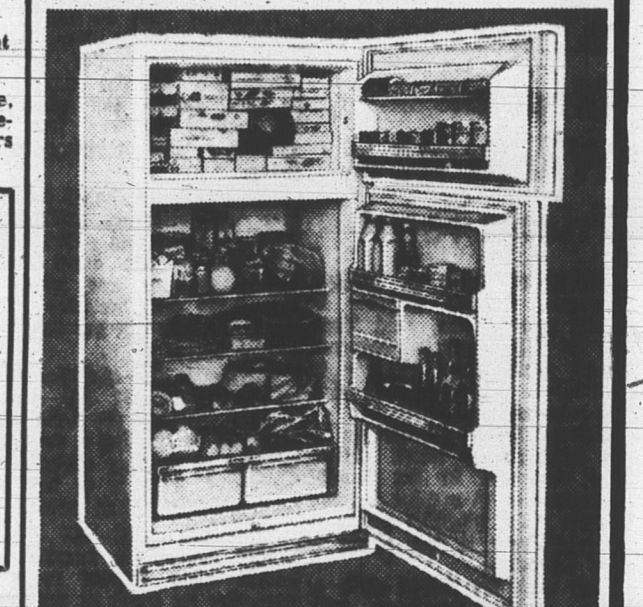
