Played Checkers With Balcombe

CORNWALL, (CP) - Edward C. Bryan, local magazine distributor, said Monday that during his brief stay in jail he was a cellmate of 2nd Lieut. Peter Balcombe and played the Canadian Army officer checkers.

Balcombe, 24, was sentenced Saturday to be hanged for the murder of Marie Anne Carrier, 21-year-old CWAC reserve sergeant from Bienville, Que., stabbed to death last October. After his conviction Balcombe was moved to a special cell, alone.

Bryan was sentenced Friday to 10 days in jail by Chief Justice J. C. McRue for contempt of court in connection with the case. However, Saturday night the chief justice signed an order changing the penalty to \$50 or 10 days and Mr. Bryan paid the fine. "He beat me three games to two," Bryan said of his checker games with Balcombe.

shooting: Lolita Lebron, 34, New York. Rafael C. Miranda, 25, New York. Andres P. Cordero, 24, New York. Irving Flores, 27, New York. Montes Rivera, 20, Tampa, Fla. Pablo Mateo, 18, Tampa, Fla. Israel Rivera, 23, Deerfield Beach, Fla.

The Rivera's are brothers. The names of the others in custody were not disclosed immediately.

Tom Kennamer, House doorkeeper, said the woman had cried, "I take responsible for all."

Fervent Note Kennamer said Lolita Lebron's purse was taken from her, and in it was a note which said: "Before God and the world my blood claims for the independence of Puerto Rico. My life I give for the freedom of my country. This is a cry for victory in our struggle for independence which for more than a half a century has tried to conquer the land that belongs to Puerto Rico. I state forever that the United States of America are betraying the sacred principles of mankind in their continuous subjugation of my country, violating their rights to be a free nation and a free people in their barbarous torture of our apostle of independence, Don Pedro Albizu Campos."

On the back of the paper, Kennamer said, was written: "I take responsibility for all." The two men who tried to kill Truman also were followers of Albizu Campos.

No Warning Like the attack on Truman, Monday's shooting took place without advance warning.

The House was considering a bill for recruiting Mexican labor. Speaker Martin had been asked if a quorum were present, and he had counted the House.

"Two hundred, forty-three members have answered their names," Martin said, far more than normally are present during the debates.

Moments later, at 2:45 p.m. EST, this placid scene was turned into the wildest confusion.

Quickly came the shout, the shots, the flag waving, so quickly many congressmen didn't even realize it was anything more than a prank.

But there was Bentley, on the floor, Jensen, unconscious, lay in a pool of blood. Davis was down, holding his ankle. Fallon and Roberts were holding their wounds.

Confusion Prevails So great was the confusion that no one knows exactly what the Puerto Ricans shouted.

Several caught it: "My country is not free. Free Puerto Rico." But there were others who thought the shout was "Viva la Mexico!" It was over so soon no one even knew how many shots were fired.

Gives Impressions Of Canadian Tour



"Canadian people have a tremendous background of culture and breeding they are not conscious of," Mrs. David M. Mayberry (above) noted American writer of short stories and lecturer for the Baha'i World Faith, told members of the Rotary Club at their weekly luncheon in the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday where she was guest speaker. Her subject was "An American woman looks at Canada."

"It was good for my American soul to submit to a rigorous customs examination on coming to Canada and also to learn that the American dollar was a discount here," Mrs. Mayberry said. "Over the border we are inclined to plunge into things two-fisted and I find the more complacent and certainly highly effective approach in Canada most admirable."

Following her Canadian tour from Victoria, B. C. to Charlottetown, Mrs. Mayberry described the shops and older homes in the former city, containing as they do much of the charm and tranquility of the Old World. "I am glad to notice the same background and attitude here, particularly the friendliness of the people whom I have met even casually in stores," she said.

"Their unfailing courtesy and affability is striking, and I have yet to record an instance of rudeness in my travels across Canada."

The speaker found both Calgary and Edmonton more like American towns but everywhere she was impressed with Canada as being on the verge of tremendous development in the conquest of wealth.
