MONDAY

Facilities in the Prince Edward Island National Park will be inspected at first hand next summer by Hon. Jean Lesage, Minister of Northern Affairs and Natural Resources, who has jurisdiction over Canada's 20 National Parks.

In answer to a query from Mr. George V. Fraser, director of the P.E.I. Travel Bureau, at last week's Federal-Provincial tourist conference in Ottawa, the Federal Minister said the building of a paved highway through the Park from Stanhope to Cavendish depends on future budgetary considerations. However, I will come to visit you in Prince Edward Island next year and have a good look at the situation in your park," Mr. Lesage promised.

Hon. C. B. Sherwood, Norton, N.B., Lorne Logan, Wolfville, N.S., and Max Thompson, Victoria, P.E.I., have been elected as the Maritime Directors for 1955 of the Board of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada, according to word received from G. M. Clemons, secretary-manager of the Association, Brantford, Ont. These men were chosen through a mail ballot amongst the Association members in their respective provinces. Hon. C. B. Sherwood is currently serving as fourth vice-president of the Association.

A policeman's life is full of surprises but Constables Archer and Howatt of the City Police force at 3:30 yesterday morning while patrolling the Victoria Park came upon a situation which even to more veteran members of a police department would present a problem.

Driving near the swimming pool the attention of the officers was attracted by cries of "help" coming from a parked automobile. When the two policemen looked inside the car they could see no occupant and thinking that perhaps someone was in the water they looked over the breastwork, but no trace of a human being could be found.

The cry for help continued to come from the parked car and as a last resort they lifted the engine bonnet of the car to find a young man about 18 years of age underneath the hood of the engine. In his cramped position he was very cold and could give the police no coherent account of how he got in this peculiar situation.

The officers on duty at the time are of the belief that the man was there for two hours or more before they found him, and had they not heard his cries for help while passing, it is quite possible that the victim could have succumbed from exposure.

Police are continuing the investigation into the incident further today.

The death occurred Saturday morning in the Prince Edward Island Hospital, after a brief illness, of George Thekla Burns, proprietress of the Rose Marie Beauty Salon on Great George Street.

Miss Burns at the time of her death was organist at the Central Christian Church and it was only last Wednesday night that she was stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage shortly after she had finished choir practise for the week.

TUESDAY

More than a thousand persons crowded into Queen Charlotte High School auditorium-gymnasium last evening despite adverse weather conditions to witness the first new school opening in Charlottetown since 1878 and to inspect the building which is rated by experts as one of the best equipped in Canada.

Following the introduction and remarks by Dr. R. G. Lea, chairman of the City School Board, Lieut. Governor T. W. L. Prowse addressed the meeting briefly as did also Premier A. W. Matheson who expressed the hope that the students would avail themselves of the opportunities here presented, under the most favourable conditions to prepare themselves for the activities of adult life.

"The facilities are here, the teaching staff is competent in every respect and I hope for many years to come that students will

reflect honour and distinction on the School as they carve a name for themselves through life," the Premier said.

Other speakers included Dr. Lloyd Shaw, Director of Education; Mr. Frank Curtis, contractor; W. W. Downie, Architect; K. A. Parker, Supt. of City Schools; Mayor J. D. Stewart; Lt. Col. L. T. Lowther, Principal; Major T. T. MacNutt, Secretary City School Board; Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Principal of Prince of Wales College; and Mr. Earle Baker, member of the City School Board.

Mr. W. R. Shaw, B.Sc., M.B.E., has returned from a visit to Canadian and United States centers. The trip was associated with business commitments in both countries. A three day conference on trade and tariffs was held at Ottawa, during which an exhaustive overhaul of markets for Canadian fruits and vegetables and tariff structures affecting Canadian growers was made in detail. Plans aimed at improvement in conditions were formulated and further conferences will be held as may be deemed necessary. The meeting was considered the best in this connection held within recent years.

Mr. Shaw attended the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto, where he presented the new trophy provided by the Canadian Horticultural Council of which he is president, to the world champion exhibitor of seed potatoes. This grower, David Hackett of Cochrane, Ontario, won the magnificent trophy, also a handsome tray and \$100. in cash on an outstanding sample of Keswick.

Mr. Shaw was very pleased with the exhibits displayed by Island producers, who won many prizes in their potato sections. The outstanding work of Mr. McLeod of Vernon on his championship box of poultry was of tremendous value in publicizing the Island poultry industry, while the Ayrshire herd of A. MacRae and Sons, showing against extreme competition, made a splendid impression.

Dr. J. H. Shaw, provincial pathologist, left for Ottawa this morning where, as director of the provincial laboratories, he will represent Prince Edward Island at the 10th annual meeting of the technical advisory committee on public health laboratory service.

While in Ottawa the members of this committee have been invited to be present at the official opening of the new virus research building of the Department of National Health and Welfare.

This building will be opened at 2 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 9, by Hon. Paul Martin, Minister of National Health and Welfare.

Seed and tablestock shipments from the Province during the month of November by rail, truck and water amounted to 1,982 carloads and 1,982 cars were tablestock while 498 were seed.

WEDNESDAY

Important resolutions featured the annual meeting of the Queen's County Federation of Agriculture held last night at Birch Court. Lively discussions took place regarding the position of the dairy industry in the light of a recent move by the National Dairy Council to have the floor price on butter removed and Mr. Donald A. MacDonald discussed the policies of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board. Mr. Lloyd Martin of Cherry Valley presided.

Mr. Martin in his annual report stressed the importance of the Federation of Agriculture to the farmers of the province. He said it was the only representative body that could go to the Government or any other organized group to ask for anything. The president felt that the turnip growers of Queen's County were getting a "dirty deal". He felt that there was too much speculation among the dealers which was done at the farmer's expense. He felt that there was a need for organized representation to see if some of the existing evils could not be remedied.

Rev. Father J. Clarence Pitre presided over a well attended meeting of his parishioners which was held in the parish hall, Rustico,

last evening. It was unanimously agreed that the parish of Rustico would be host to the Acadians of the Province at a grand celebration marking the 200th anniversary of the Expulsion of the Acadians.

This celebration is being organized and will be held under the auspices of the Acadian Convention of P. E. I. All the Acadian groups in the Province are to participate in this important historical event. The central committee in charge of organizing this day of remembrance is composed of: J. Edmund Arsenault, president, Rev. Father J. C. Pitre, Vice-president; Rev. Father Charles Gallant, secretary; M. Joseph Gaudet, Treasurer; and Charles M. Arsenault, Joseph Gaudin, Dr. J. Aubin Doucet and Rev. Father Jean F. Boule as directors.

An enjoyable banquet and dance at Howard's Restaurant last evening signalled the opening of the 7th annual Summerside Kinsmen Christmas tree project with approximately 85 Kinsmen, Kinettes and guests in attendance.

The chairman of this year's Christmas tree project, Kin Harold Arsenault, reported that the Christmas trees have been erected in Holmans and in the Co-op Super Market and already some very fine donations have been received. He stated that the addresses by the clergy, in behalf of the project will begin over radio station CJRW on December 14th and that the delivery of Christmas parcels to the needy will be held on the 24th. He also announced a special program, during which donations will be solicited, would be held over the local radio station on the evening of the 21st.

The death of Frank P. Fraser of Alberton occurred Monday evening in a Montreal hospital where he had undergone a serious operation some days previously.

Mr. Fraser, who was 66 years of age, was a son of the late Captain and Mrs. Daniel Fraser of Alberton South. As a young man he engaged in fishing and later became manager of the Albion Terrace Hotel. In more recent years he operated a small store until his retirement.

Mr. Robert Morson Agnew, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Agnew, 55 Upper Prince Street, has been awarded the I.O.D.E. overseas scholarship for Prince Edward Island which entitles him to do two years of post graduate work in a United States University. Robert is at present completing his Master of Science degree at Dalhousie University. He expects to proceed overseas next fall.

Born in Cardigan, Nov. 20, 1932, he moved with his parents to Charlottetown in 1948 where he entered the special matriculation class at Prince of Wales College. After graduating in 1951 he entered Dalhousie University, where he obtained his Bachelor of Science degree in 1953. Mr. Agnew's studies are in the field of bacteriology.

The death of Mr. Isaac Meggison, a life-long resident of Mill River, occurred at Alberton late Tuesday afternoon. He was 89 years of age.

The Teena Liguorin Club of Holy Redeemer parish saw one of their projects brought to a successful issue last evening when the lights were turned on to show in detail the adoration scene they built and placed in position atop the Community Centre.

The production is 24 ft long and 14 ft high and was started by a view to having it ready for placing before Christmas as a gesture towards placing "Christ back in Christmas," and as a contribution to the opening days of the Charlottetown Centennial year. The scene is illuminated by 26 moderate candlepower lights, four 150 candlepower spot lights and six flood lights of 200 C.P. each.

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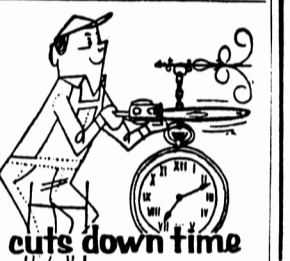
