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The possibility, and indeed the desirability, of direct steamship communication between Canada and France is being much discussed. If Canadian manufacturers, merchants and shippers take the question up with their usual enterprise, there is little doubt that the trade of the Dominion with the French republic may be largely increased, but, of course, direct importation into France will be necessary to avoid the "surtaxe d'entrepôt" which is levied on importations by way of any European country. There is already a good deal of irregular steam communication between the two countries during the season of navigation, and no doubt the steamship companies may be disposed to pay more attention to the service if they receive any encouragement to do so.
