MACKEREL FISHING.—The catch of mackerel in Shediac harbor this season has been remarkably good. One day last week, Rev. E. A. W. Hanington, of Ottawa, and Mr. W. L. C. Hanington, accompanied by a Frenchman, caught eight hundred mackerel inside of an hour and a half.

A LITTLE BOY named Currie, whose parents reside on Water street, had a narrow escape from drowning in the dock between Peake's No. 1 and No. 2 wharves to-day. The little fellow, in company with others, went in to bath at 1 o'clock. He waded towards the channel of the dock, when he accidentally slipped in and sank to the bottom. A few moments after he sank his body appeared, floating on the surface, apparently stiff and lifeless. Mr. Frederick Douse was passing at the time, and saw the body in the water. He quickly threw off his coat, gallantly sprang into the water—which was about ten feet deep—and swam ashore, carrying with him the lifeless body. The body was removed to Mr. Bank's residence, where, after a short treatment, it showed symptoms of returning life. At two o'clock the boy had fully recovered from the effects of the almost fatal ducking, and was fit for removal to his home.

TO-DAY the market was very large and well stocked with cherries, black currants, cauliflowers, carrots, and vegetables of all descriptions. In the stalls of Messrs. Dawson & LePage were displayed a splendid assortment of cauliflowers, and were shown by Mr. James Lewis several bunches of carrots and turnips which were surprisingly large for the present season. Prices were as follows: Beef, (small) per lb., from 6 to 12 cents; do., per gr., from 5 to 8 cents; mutton, from 5 to 10 cents; veal, from 3 to 7 cents per lb.; lamb, per lb., from 6 to 10 cents; butter (fresh) 14 to 16 cents; do. (tub) from 12 to 13 cents per lb.; chickens, from 35 to 45 cents; ducks from 20 to 25 cents; potatoes, from 35 to 40 cents; oats, from 45 to 50 cents; eggs, from 10 to 12 cents per doz.; hay, from 35 to 40 cents; green peas (per qt.) 12 to 16 cents; currants (black) per qt., from 8 to 12 cts.; do (white) 16 cts.; do (red) 16 cts. per qt.; potatoes (new) per peck, from 20 to 25 cts.; old per bushel, from 35 to 42 cts.

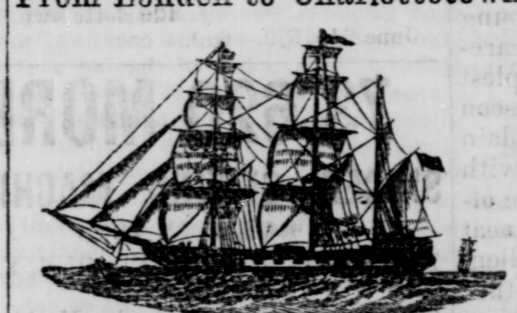
