REDS HINT Continued from page 6. opinion. All headquarters also was keeping a tight silence on an envelope handed to liaison officers by the Reds Wednesday. This presumably contained the Communist rejection of a Sept 6 proposal by Gen. Ridgway, supreme Allied commander. Ridgway wanted to change the
