Northern Ireland's self-appointed "ambassador of good-will", Samuel G. Haughton, has lined up some persuasive pointers to boost trade and attract new industries to his country. A leading industrialist in Ulster, he is on a whirlwind four-week tour of North America to induce Canadian and U.S. industrialists to expand to Ireland. He claims his country is packed with industrial advantages that other areas in the sterling block lack. Besides an abundance of "first-class labor," Mr. Haughton explained that the government readily gives financial aid to new industries. He is particularly interested in attracting textile manufacturers, as N. Ireland's unemployed textile workers now number 30,000.
