Parliament Not Likely To Close By Jan. 14 Deadline

Parliamentary session of the Progressive Conservative Government will not be finished by Jan. 14 deadline originally set by inter-party agreement.

The understanding, with the cooperation of the government and other parties had called for Parliament proroguing in time to free the Liberals for their Jan. 14-16 convention to choose a new leader as successor to St. Honoré Louis S. Laurent.

But a heavy backlog of business - some of it related to the election - faces the Commons for its resumption Friday, Jan. 3, and indications are that the session will roll into at least late January.

While informants say there is not yet any formal agreement on the point, expectations in political circles are that there will be general consent to a recess over the period of the Liberal convention to allow Liberal members to attend.

Apart from the stiff agenda prospects of a mid-January prorogation were balked when back-benchers kicked over the traces earlier this month on learning that party leaders planned only the briefest of Christmas and New Year recesses, not enough to let Westeros and Martiners get home.
