Montague To Take Action To Collect Taxes

The Montague Town Council last night decided to take legal action against all persons whose town taxes are in arrears. The decision was taken at the regular monthly meeting of the council, presided over by His Worship Mayor B.H. Yeo.

Yesterday, Dec. 10, was the deadline for the paying of tax arrears, and all unpaid following that date were to be subject to legal proceedings. The Town Clerk reported that there were approximately \$2,500.00 still outstanding, and that the list of those in arrears was being prepared. It was thought that everything would be in readiness to begin court proceedings early in January.

Following the minutes of the last meeting, the bills were read and amounts to \$1,042.22 general account, and \$76.00 building account, were ordered paid. On motion the clerk was instructed to issue cheque of \$35.00 to Stewart and Beck as the town payment to bill of \$75.75 presented for sidewalk.

Correspondence was read concerning the paving of the streets in Montague, and it was thought possible that the project could be completed next year.

The street committee reported that several culverts had been installed at different locations throughout the town, and that several residents on the Wood Island Hill had installed culverts in front of their driveways.

The police committee reported that conditions were satisfactory and that the parking problem was practically solved. Councillor Hessian presented a report on fines during the year which amounted to \$185.00, less secretarial fees of \$75.00, balance \$110.00 submitted to the town account.

The fire committee reported that the equipment had been checked and re-serviced following the St. Peter's Temple fire on Friday. The question of installing two more
