THE Y.M.C.A. WORK IN MANCHURIA

LONDON, May 10.—Probably no Y. M. C. A. in the world has entertained so many visitors in a short time as the Army Association at Dally, Manchuria. On some days from ten to fifteen thousand men waiting for their steamers were entertained, and from 130,000 to 150,000 were served in one month. Nearly all of the 300,000 soldiers in Manchuria are being met by the Associations at Dally and Lieuchtung, the two points of embarkation.

TRAMP KILLED IN WESTERN WRECK

SAN JOSE, Cal., May 10.—A serious wreck occurred at Edenville, 7 miles south of this city, when the Southern Pacific overland limited, west bound, running 50 miles an hour, was derailed. A tramp was killed and thirty or forty passengers, mostly Chinese, were more or less seriously injured. The accident was due to a truck under a car behind the baggage car jumping the track.
