ONE OF THE FOUNDATION LAYERS OF EDMONTON'S BUSINESS WORLD IS HONORED BY BUSINESS MEN

J. Frank McMillan, Late Manager of the Royal Bank Here, Tendered Complimentary Banquet Saturday Night—Mayor Duggan Was Toastmaster, While Prominent Men Gave Eulogistic Speeches

(Edmonton Morning Bulletin) Citizens of Edmonton representing every phase of professional and commercial life assembled at a complimentary dinner in the Edmonton Club Saturday night to do honor to J. Frank McMillan, retired manager of the local branch of the Royal Bank of Canada (formerly of Prince Edward Island). The function in every way contributed testimony to the high regard in which Mr. McMillan is held generally by the people of this city, particularly those who have come into contact with him during his thirteen years of service with an institution which has been a contributing factor to the progress of the capital city of Alberta.

There was the feeling at this banquet Saturday night—and it was evidenced many times—that Edmonton's commercial life had taken a step toward the goal of progress as a result of the considerable activity of such of the class of foundation layers to which Mr. McMillan belongs. As a testimony of the high regard in which he is held the function could not have been more appropriate. Kingpins in profession and in commerce, members of the house which legislates and rules for the province of Alberta, were present in numbers. The gathering was indeed, an assembly bespeaking praise and appreciation for one whose alliance with Edmonton's advancement has been close at all times.

Edmonton Owes a Debt Mr. McMillan came to this city when it was in a stage of infancy. He has labored and prospered with it during its period of adolescence. He has seen Edmonton advance, progress and prosper during its most growing season, and speakers who dealt with this period of residence here, outlined on Saturday night much of the importance of the part played by their honored guest.

Mr. McMillan was looked upon by all present at the function as a citizen whose calibre has been rated high at all times and expression was general throughout the evening that in his departure from Edmonton the city would suffer a loss. But expression was also given to the thought that he would not be entirely lost to the community, for, according to present plans, it is the intention of the late Royal Bank manager to return to Alberta's capital following a tour east, and then to engage in business here.
