Insolvency and Incest.

OTTAWA, March 7. Mr. Cameron's Bill regarding incest has been referred to committee. Mr. Beatty's Bill respecting the discharge of insolvents has met with general opposition in the House of Commons. The debate on it was, yesterday, adjourned. Some papers were moved for by the members, and the House then adjourned.

Terrific Gale on the English Coast.

LONDON, March 7. A terrific gale is raging on the British coast, and great damage to shipping is reported. Several large ships have been wrecked.

The French Constitution.

PARIS, March 7. The Chamber of Deputies has rejected a motion for the revision of the Constitution.

The Land Act.

LONDON, March 7. The House of Lords has appointed a committee to enquire into the working of the Land Act.

Telegraph Notes.

Governor Alex. H. Stephens, of Georgia, died at Atlanta on the 3rd inst.

Bonds of the face valued \$70,000 were taken from the Quarantee Trust and Safe Deposit Co., in Philadelphia on the 2nd inst.

The Governor of New York has vetoed a bill reducing the rate of fare on the New York elevated railroads known as the "Five cent bill."

The missing thirteen of the crew of the British steamer "William Dickinson," before reported abandoned, have arrived at Malta.

The Government of Hungary has undertaken to complete the removal of dynamite rocks at the Iron Gate of the Danube. They expect to be reimbursed for the cost of the work by tolls imposed on vessels navigating the river.

The London "Law Times" says that the recent charge that can be brought against Sheridan is conspiracy to murder, and his defence therefore, is not within the strict terms of the treaty, but the United States has the discretionary power in the matter.

U. S. Secretary Chandler, received a cable message from Minister Hunt of St. Petersburg stating that Ensign Hunt and two other surgeons of the Jeannette, arrived at St. Petersburg on the 4th. All are in good health.

A cable from London says that George Hepburn, of the Canadian Pacific Syndicate, made a suggestion to the London press for relieving distress in Ireland by assisted emigration of 10,000 agriculturists to the Northwest territory. He offers to provide capital for starting by way of a loan.

Sir Arthur Olway has been unanimously elected Deputy Speaker and Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, vice Right Hon. Lyon Playfair, resigned. The motion moved by Richard O'Shaughnessy, declaring expedient to introduce in Ireland the principle of compulsory education, was agreed to.

Another chief of the "Black Hand" Society has been arrested at Arcos, Spain, whose duty it was to visit various towns with copies of the constitution and by-laws of the organization, for the purpose of organizing branches thereof. Several land-lords in Xeres have received letters demanding money.

The owners and underwriters of the British steamer "Quebec," which recently arrived at Liverpool, after a passage of fifty days from Portland, having been disabled, have awarded the captain the sum of \$10,000. The captain has also been appointed to the command of the British steamer "Brooklyn."

At Jena University, the past week, there were 21 serious duels in one day and owing to the fact that the swords had not been properly cleaned since having been used previously, some forty students are in hospital suffering from blood poisoning. Two have already died and one has committed suicide. Duelling at the German Universities has lately been carried to great excess.

The authorities have adopted a plan for the entry of Hamburg into the Zollverein. Grand warehouses are to be erected, separated from the town by a canal. The construction of the plan will require the demolition of 1,400 houses and the removal of 1,000 persons. The cost will be five and a half million pounds. The work will be begun next summer, and finished in five years.

The Sun's cable letter says it is not thought that Challemeil-Lacour will be at any pains to oblige England during his official residence in London. He met with little courtesy in British society and his feelings toward England are not of the warmest. Mr. Gladstone had an interview with him and Ferre, on Thursday, and the conversation, as reported by a correspondent, was by no means reassuring, as Ferre as it referred to the settlement of the French status in Egypt. Both statesmen took a firm stand on the subject and told Mr. Gladstone that nothing short of a renunciation of France in a position, equal to that occupied by her under joint control, would be satisfactory. The foreign policy of the new French Government promises to be independent and aggressive, and to add materially to England's embarrassment in Egypt.

The latest news from the overflowed country along the Mississippi River is that what we know as "sunk lands," in St. Francis River region, are entirely submerged, and that nearly as far down as Helena, people are living in the upper stories of houses where there is more than one story

to the house, or are floating around on rafts or in boats. Most of the inhabitants, however, have deserted their homes and gone to the high lands back from the river. The streets of New Madrid are submerged to a depth of from two to four feet, and there is water in almost every house. The whole country back of that place, as far as Cairo, on the Missouri side, and from Hickman south for over 50 miles, is inundated. Corn, live stock and fences have been destroyed, but no great amount of suffering among the people is reported.

Mr. Labouchere proclaims in the "Fortnightly Review" that the coming democracy will turn the occupiers of land into owners, plundering the rich for the benefit of the poor, levying taxation only on those who can best afford to pay, exacting progressive income tax up to fifty per cent., and limiting the right to property alike in acres and money. Labouchere being a prominent Radical member of Parliament, and the sworn ally of Mr. Chamberlain, and the disclosure of the views is likely to strengthen the Conservatives. Labouchere's programme demands that the Whigs shall be handed over to the Conservatives, without even an exception in favor of the Marquis of Hartington. Labouchere styles the Whigs "emasculating traitors," no longer to be tolerated within the Radical fold. The programme calls for equalized electoral districts, triennial Parliaments, reduction of the Crown's income, abolition of the House of Lords and of the Established Church, the passage of a law limiting the amount of land to be held by one person, the saddling of taxation exclusively upon the rich, and local self-government for Ireland.

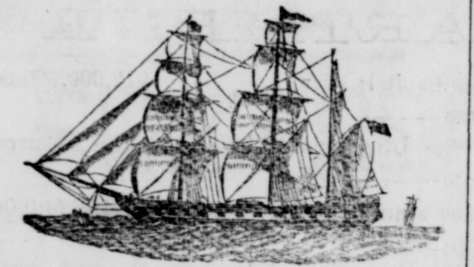

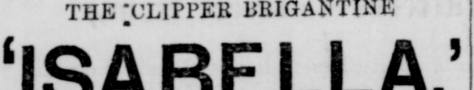
