Wilson Outlines Plan For Atlantic N-Force

By JOSEPH MACSWEN LONDON (CP) - Prime Minister Harold Wilson has outlined his hopes for an Atlantic nuclear force and proposed turning over to it much, but not all, of Britain's nuclear capacity.

Before a tense House of Commons, Wilson outlined the Atlantic force proposal which he made to President Lyndon Johnson in Washington last week and which now is being studied at the annual 15-country NATO ministerial meeting in Paris.

hot and confused controversy for weeks, would include: 1. Britain's V-bomber planes, except those needed for commitments outside the NATO area. The far East and the defence of India are much in Wilson's mind in this connection. 2. British Polaris submarines now being built, perhaps from three to five. 3. An equal number of United States Polaris submarines. 4. "Some form" of mixed-manned force. The U.S. has long proposed a 25-ship surface mixed-manned fleet, armed with Polaris missiles, but Wilson stressed that Britain has made no commitment on whether it would join such a fleet if it is created.

GIVES FEW DETAILS In his major foreign policy speech, the Labor prime minister refused to be drawn out on details of his plans for the 20th day V-bomber force which now constitutes Britain's nuclear deterrent until the Polaris submarines are completed. But he indicated that those

places withheld from the Atlantic force could serve in "inter-warlike stance, Wilson said national police work or peace-keeping in the Far East, where the situation has drastically altered since Red China exploded its first nuclear device. "We would really be beyond the point of no return" if the spread of nuclear weapons continues where India is seriously worried about China's nuclear capability. Wilson seemed to want to retain control of Britain's nuclear deterrent at all costs and the Labor left-wing would like to see the "bomb" completely of the "bomb".
