Magistrate Adjourns Failure To Stop Case

At the request of Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGuigan, Jerome Patrick Murphy, Belle River, was remanded for argument until Feb. 16, in Queens County magistrate's court before Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. Friday afternoon.

Murphy, who is counselled by John P. Nicholson, is charged with failing to stop at the scene of an accident.

Also remanded to the same date, was Malcolm Gordon Bell, Alexandria, on the charge of having care and control of a motor vehicle while his abilities were impaired by alcohol. Counsel for the defence is Gerald R. Foster, Q.C.

Provincial Rally Set For SDU On 'Crisis In Latin America'

"The crisis in Latin America" will be the theme for a provincial rally to be held at St. Dunstan's University tomorrow afternoon and sponsored by the Canadian Federation of Catholic College Students (CFCOS).

The purpose of the rally is to inform interested students, young workers and others of the problems existing in Latin America. Invitations have been extended to such groups as the Newman Club, the Young Christian Workers, Sodality, youth clubs and others.

The program will include speakers from New York City, the Scarborough Foreign Missions and the Coady International Institute of Antigonish, N.S.

Mr. Monteza is a native of Panama. Sister Philippe-du-Sauveur will speak on the "Church in Latin America".

Failing To Stop At Accident Scene Cases Are Adjourned

Two cases of failure to stop at the scene of an accident were adjourned until Feb. 16, by Magistrate A.J. Haslam in city police court yesterday.
