

Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie Gives Health & Welfare Report

Reporting on health and welfare at the P.E.I. Women's Institute convention, Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie, Alberton, noted with appreciation the co-operation of parents in making the public health clinics the success that they were during the past spring. Mrs. Wilkie made reference to the establishment of a school for cerebral palsied children in Charlottetown and expressed the hope that such a school would soon be made available to a larger number of these children.

Her report indicated that there were 300 mental patients at Falkenburg, 25 sub-normal children in the Province and about 100 elderly people that could be classified as feeble minded.

A marked improvement in health facilities throughout the Province was noted in the Health and Welfare report. A great deal of credit for this improvement was given to the routine inspections of the sanitary engineers employed by the Department of Health.

"It has been said that 'our family life is our greatest heritage, and we must preserve it.' A home should not be just a house in which to eat, sleep and live. It should be a place where our children are brought up, and taught to realize their responsibilities as future citizens, and where our moral standards are raised and our children are given a sense of security and a sense of an important factor in maintaining good mental health. This would eventually result in improving world conditions and creating international good will.

"Home Economics means more than the proper feeding and care of our families. It means the art of living together in home and community. It means developing an awareness of the beauty and responsibilities of daily living. It means making wise use of what we have at hand for greater efficiency and beauty of our homes, even in the clothes we wear. The woman who raises a family of healthy, spiritually controlled and physically balanced children on a limited income, deserves all the credit we can give. Sometimes these things just happen, but much more often they are the result of careful planning, study and management.

"Homemaking is one of the most exacting of professions. To be even a moderately successful housewife one must be a hostess, cook, seamstress, business manager, nurse and consistent. The quality of our efforts is revealed in our homes, our children and in the community in which we live. Each person has a great responsibility in his or her own life, and the lives of those whom we contact, as we know that someone each and everyone of us shall have to render account of our stewardship and shall then be judged according to the manner in which our lives have influenced the lives and personalities of our fellowmen.

"We are told that conservation of life and of the most precious material things in the minds of men today and, as you know, Canada has been divided into 3 types of areas for Civil Defence purposes, Gorge Areas and Mutual Aid Areas Mobile support and reception areas. In the support areas the Women's Institute will be able to give assistance. The Forget area has special characteristics which makes it a probable target for enemy attacks in the event of war, while from the point of view of natural or civil disaster each and every community can be classed as a 'forget area.' In the mobile and reception areas provisions are made to care for the evacuated and homeless. Here it is that our Women's Institute women can play an important part. It is necessary that we organize, plan
