## B.Y.C.-R.C.A.F. Start Island Volleyball Finals Tonight

The first games in the best-of-seven series for the P.E.I. Volleyball Championship will be played tonight at the Y.M.C.A. starting at 7:30 with the B.Y.C. Whites, Charlottetown champions, taking on the Summerside R.C.A.F. The two squads have met twice before in duels for the Island crown. The youth club were victors in 1953-54 and the all-force took the title last year. The youth club have been the power in city volleyball since the league began four years ago. Each year the B.Y.C. Whites won the title and after finishing the regular league on top this season defeated Prince of Wales 4-1 in the semi-finals and dumped Y.M.C.A. 5-1 in the finals. ### Great Final Series Ended; League Outstanding Success

If, at the beginning of the year one had ventured the opinion that before the season end 3,000 fiercely partisan fans would howl themselves hoarse over a league game, he would have been regarded as a very good comedian indeed. That reaction would have been natural enough. Some fans (though few the number) had become accustomed to a somewhat faster brand of play dished up by the Charlottetown Islanders and the pros from other Maritime centres and even those who were trying to bring local hockey back at aren't expecting too much in the first year. The final results surprised everybody and we can look ahead with confidence that next year the league will be even better. The league is a success with Cleaver MacLean as President, Elmer Blanchard Vice-President and Johnny Squarebriggs did a fine job with a tricky proposition. The league experienced unexpected growing pains as it blossomed at a fantastic rate. If we had had a Nicodemus in our midst, we might have foreseen it. But we didn't and some trouble arose. But on the overall picture the experience will be a great help in setting up next year's league.

We have heard some reports that Summerside may drop out of the Island picture and concentrate on a Prince County League. If that is in their best interests then that, of course, is what they should do. But if they are contemplating the move because they think they can't compete with the Charlottetown teams the expression that comes first to mind is "shades of the Summerside Cry-stals." We thought, and we still think that the Aces were hampered more by the elements than by a lack of talent in this year's hoop. With Civic Stadium ready and waiting at the outset of the season the Aces should be able to whip into shape and leave the same rate at the Charlottetown teams and should more than hold their own in the competition. ## Small Foreign Field Entered In Boston Marathon Today

**BOSTON (AP)** — With a smaller-than-usual foreign field entered, the United States is hoping for its first Boston marathon victory in 11 years today. The last American winner of the 26-mile, 385-yard race from suburban Hopkinton to Boston's Back bay was John Kelley in 1945. This year the U.S. is pinning its main hopes on another John Kelley, no relation, and on Nick Costes, Natick, Mass., school teacher who ran the fastest marathon ever recorded for an American at 2:19:57 while finishing third last year. Twenty-one Canadians are entered but only Canadian champion marathoner George Hillier of St. John's, Nfld., a student at Boston University, is given much chance. He has said he will be satisfied if he finishes in the first 10. **SMALLER FIELD** The foreign field is smaller this year because it is an Olympic year. Apparently many nations prefer to use their money for Olympic expenses rather than for sending runners to Boston. **VICTORIA (CP)** The first attempt of the season to swim the strait of Juan de Fuca ended in failure Wednesday when Ben Laughren was pulled from the water after four hours and 25 minutes. Laughren, 274-pound Victoria chef, was defeated by adverse tides which kept him within four miles of his starting point. Laughren entered the water at nearby Gonzales point at 9:52 a.m., EST and was pulled out at 2:17 p.m. AST.
