The Canada Pacific Tariff.

OTTAWA, May 12. Sir Charles Tupper, in the House of Commons, yesterday, explained that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company were only entitled to consider the amount received for stock, 60 per cent, as capital, on which a dividend of 10 per cent. must be paid, before the Government shall have the right of revising the tariff.

The Dynamite Conspirators.

LONDON, May 12. The prisoners on examination, charged with conspiracy to blow up public buildings with dynamite, were yesterday committed for trial on charge of high treason and felony.

Pleaded Guilty.

DUBLIN, May 12. The prisoners O'Brien and Doyle, on trial for conspiring to murder, pleaded guilty.

Compensation for Agricultural Improvements.

LONDON, May 12. A bill for the compensation of agricultural tenants for improvements, was introduced in the Imperial Parliament yesterday.

Telegraph Notes.

A terrific snow storm visited Galway on the 10th inst. Snow there lies over two feet deep.

A young German of great promise, who had just left the military college, shot himself at Monaco after losses at gaming tables.

Prince Roland B-naparte will take the first opportunity presented to offer himself in Corsica as a candidate for the Chamber of Deputies.

A French mail steamer from San Thomas, brings the following advices: San Thomas, May 5.—Austrian ship "Beatrice," with a cargo of coal from Newport, was burned to the water's edge on April 29th, at La Pointe a Pitre. The loss is estimated at £4,000.

A tragedy which has caused a great sensation was enacted in Rue Saint Denis, in Paris on the 10th inst. While a marriage party was proceeding along the thoroughfare on the way to the church where the marriage was to be solemnized, a rival of the bridegroom suddenly appeared on the scene, and to the horror of the party, shot and killed him. The assassin poisoned herself after firing the fatal shot.

In the British House of Commons on the 10th inst., Mr. Tevelyan, Chief Secretary for Ireland, said that the State aided Irish emigrants who had left for America under the direction of Mr. Teake's committee were all likely to support themselves and their families. A proper proportion between workers and non-workers had been carefully observed. The American Government, he said, had made rules to prevent the entrance into that country of those likely to become paupers. James O'Kelly, member for Roscommon, gave notice he would question the Government concerning the protests of Governor Butler of Massachusetts in regard to Irish pauper emigration.

Advices from Hayti are extremely conflict- ing. Some report that the cause of the rebels is progressing favorably, others state that the rebel force in Miragoane is on the point of surrendering, the water supply of the town being cut off. The true situation appears to be that Miragoane, which is de- fended by about 700 rebels, holds out against 6,000 Government troops, while the rest of the Republic is comparatively quiet, although there is a rumor that the town of St. Marc is in arms, not for Gen. Caselais, but in favor of Gen. Piquant. Several noted persons at Cape Haytien have been arrested. Six hundred fugitive inhabitants of Miragoane have reached Port-au-Prince on board a Norwegian bark. They state the rebels blew up the bridge at Miragoane with dynamite, killing 200 per- sons and wounding 200 more. The boat with four men, which ran the blockade at Miragoane, has arrived at Kingstons, carry- ing letters to General Baselais, assuring him the forces in Miragoane can resist the siege for four months. President Solomon has issued a decree that properties of political offenders shall be held as security for all war expenses and the Government is now mortgaging such properties. Business is stagnant.

Lightning struck a tank of oil in the yard of the Standard Oil Works at Cavan Point, Jersey City, at 3.30 o'clock on the 10th. The tank exploded, and was followed by the explosion and burning of seven more large storehouses. The dock, several tank boats and 100 feet of trestle work leading to Black Tom's Island were also destroyed. Tank No. 7, filled with naphtha—probably 20,000 or 30,000 barrels—exploded with terrific force. The fire is now eating its way across the track of the New Jersey Central toward ten large tanks said to hold 150,000 barrels, three of which are filled with naphtha. Small farmers to the north of the yard, assisted by firemen, are moving their household goods. The fire is raging with fearful force. The company had, besides the oil contained in tanks, about 250,000 barrels of refined oil in storehouse, all of which is destroyed. The loss will reach half a million dollars. The burning works extend, with those of a Eagle refinery, about three quarters of a mile inland. The buildings that have been destroyed were situated in the midst of tanks. The buildings burned comprise an engine house, carpenter shop, boiler and pump room, two warehouses, cooper shop and blacksmith shops. Six men lost their lives; the bodies have not been recovered.

The American schooner "Commodore Foot" arrived at North Sydney on May 7th, with Captain Thompson and crew of the British barque "Zambesi," which foundered at sea on the 5th inst. The captain reports that he sailed from Sunderland, April 11th, with 600 tons of coal and 150 tons of coke for Quebec. Experienced rough weather coming westward, on the 5th, at 9 p. m., about sixteen miles east of Scatarie struck heavy ice which stove in the bow. The ship foundered in about twenty minutes. The captain and crew took to the boats and were out about twelve hours when they were picked up by the schooner that brought them into port. [The "Zam- besi" was a vessel of 1057 tons register, built at Sand Point, N. B. in 1857 and owned by George Cairns, of Newcastle, G. B., from whence she hailed.]
