SUMMERSIDE NEWS

THE dust nuisance still prevails. We regret to hear of the death of Miss John Maynard, wife of John Maynard of Port Hill, who died at that place Wednesday.

THE SS. Premier arrived here Wednesday evening, and sailed yesterday morning with the following: 1560 bush potatoes, 350 bush oats, 8 live hogs and other sundries.

AMONG the things of interest on Water street yesterday was a large eagle, captured by Robert Glover, jr., at Graham's Point, New London. It was measured seven feet from tip to tip.

SS. Fastnet arrived here on Wednesday at 6 o'clock with general cargo, sailed the same day with 902 cases lobsters, 650 bush oats, 200 bush potatoes, 650 pounds beef, 10 cases eggs, 2 pigs and 5 passengers.

DR. WILLIAM WARBURTON, who has been for the last 21 years in the British Army stationed in India, is now in company with his brother James of Charlottetown, visiting the home of his childhood at L. 11.

QUITE a large number of passengers came over on the Northumberland last night. Among them was Mr. A. E. Arsenault of Egmont Bay, who has been attending St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, for the past term.

At the Kinkora races Wednesday Frank Farrow's horse took first, J. Burn's second, William Burn's third in the three minute class; Joseph Harding's horse first, Hugh Creamer's second, Frank Warren's third and L. Dawson's fourth in the free for all.

THE schooner Jennie Armstrong, owned by Capt. James Grad, of this town, which has been chartered by the Government to be used on the tunnel route survey, left here yesterday morning for Charlottetown, where she will be equipped with all necessary articles for the work.

THE catch of lobsters is falling off along our shores. Other years at this season they were on the increase. The daily catches are so small that the different factories are discharging some of their help as there is nothing for them to do.

PRESENT appearances would indicate a very small return for the large outlay in carrying on this industry. This is the greatest loss to the country as well as to the men engaged in the business.

SUMMERSIDE would seem to be in favour of this season with the agriculturists. We have the gathering of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons to-day, and about the last of July the High Court of the Independent Order of Foresters of N. B., N. S. and P. E. Island will assemble, at which the notable and eloquent Dr. Oronhyateka will be present.

A little later on the annual Convention of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, one of the oldest and largest societies in the country will take place here.

ALTHOUGH S'ide can boast of a fair number of churches, Sunday schools and other societies having for their objects the moral welfare of the public, yet there is one thing which we consider would be of great interest to the young people of S'ide that has not received the attention necessary for its inauguration, that is a night school. These schools have been established with great success in every city and town of any importance in Canada and the United States, where young men, after the performance of their day's duties, can under the tuition of competent teachers, gather knowledge on whatever branches their education may be deficient. Now that we have a public library why could not such a school be started in conjunction with it. We feel sure that the services of teachers could be procured at a reasonable rate and once a week a debate could be held by the different classes on the arguments from the past week's study, thus giving to the work a further impetus. Looking at it from a moral standpoint, we are sure it would do much for our young men. By being interested in their studies, young men would have their attention fully engaged and would be more likely to steer clear of the rum hole with which this town is infested and which prove such a centre of attraction to so many.

Threatened With A Ducking. London, June 20.—Lady Henry Somerset, who will be remembered in America, has arranged a resolution by writing Mr. Weymss, Sir Charles Dilke's opponent for parliament in the Forest of Dean constituency, offering to go on the stump in Weymss' interest for the sake of denouncing Sir Charles on his grounds. She states that Mr. Weymss would assist her. Weymss indignantly refused the offer, declaring that he meant to fight fair, and win on political issues or not at all.

THE mines of the Forest of Dean division, who are devoted to Dilke, are highly incensed and threaten to duck Henry Somerset, and tar and feather Stead, if they attempt to carry out their proposition, in spite of Weymss' declination to sanction it. There seems little doubt of Dilke's election. There is some talk of a social boycott being organized against him in the house of commons if he obtains his seat.

Rev. Father Mollinger, the faith cure priest of Pennsylvania, died the other day of rupture. He could not heal himself, but he pretended to cure others of every form of disease. Neither he or any other thaumaturgist has ever attempted to give a one-legged person two legs, although that ought to be just as easy as the alleged instantaneous healing of aneers and similar facts. In fact if the law of nature can like Mollinger should therefore be able to bring the dead to life. He was educated as a physician, but became a clergyman in his thirtieth year, and is described as a kindly old man. He died rich, his estate being valued at \$425,000. At Mount Troy, Allegheny, where he officiated, he had an immense collection of sacred relics.
