

MR. HENSLEY'S REPORT.

(Concluded in condensed form.) OFFICE OF PUBLIC LANDS.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND. 31 June, 1867.

The Honorable Joseph Hensley, Attorney General: SIR,

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of date 1st inst., requesting a Return of the amount of Securities in this Office for the Balances due on Public Lands, and their real or positive value; also, a Return of the area of unsold Lands, and their value.

I beg to state that in the Schedule A, annexed, are set forth the Balances due from the purchasers of Government Lands on the Worrell and Lot 11 Estates, Selkirk Estate, Winchester Estate, and Montgomery Estate, as submitted to the House of Assembly in the Detailed Accounts of this Office. The balances due from the purchasers of Lands on the Cunard Estate, being incomplete at the time of submitting such Detailed Accounts, have since been prepared, and are the amounts due 1st June, 1867.

The sum of £88,994 8s. Od. currency, (£52,590 5s. 4d. sterling), is the amount due this Office, and is secured by the 23d Section of the Land Purchase Act, and is thereby declared to be a specific lien and charge on the Land sold, having priority over every other lien of charge. No better security can possibly be held, and after ten years' management of this Office, I feel fully justified in asserting that the amount represented as due to the Land Office is a real and positive asset of the Colony, every fraction of which can and may be recovered.

The quantity of Lands, the property of the Government, remaining unsold, amounts to 143,775 acres, as described in the Schedule B, annexed, and are valued at £34,344 8s. Od. currency, (£22,856 2s. Od. sterling).

In accordance with instructions in your communication, "rather to under-estimate than to over-estimate the worth of the Lands in question," as will appear in the Schedule B, 54,797 acres are classed as of inferior quality, and may possibly remain some time unsold, I have, therefore, omitted them from any valuation in forming the estimate of the worth of the Public Lands of the Colony.

I beg here to be allowed to state, that the Accounts of the Public Lands Office, ending 31st January, 1867, show that the operations of the Land Purchase Act, not only morally and politically, but also financially, have been highly advantageous to the Colony, there having accrued a positive gain of over £3,000 (£2,000 sterling), as will appear by the Schedule C, annexed, by the purchase of Estates.

SIR, I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 61, of the 17th June last, enclosing a Minute of your Council and other Documents, relative to certain sums claimed by the Commissariat Department at Halifax on account of the expenses incurred in connection with the Detachment of Troops lately stationed in Prince Edward Island. I referred your representations on this subject, together with those of the Executive Council, for the consideration of the Secretary of State for War, and I have to acquaint you that in order to relieve your Government of so much of the claim which has been made upon it as would be equivalent to the expense which would have been chargeable to Army Funds had the troops remained in Nova Scotia, the Controller of the Army Expenditure in that Province has been directed to prepare a new account, comprising the expense of transport, lodging-money, office rent, extra wages and contingencies, and the actual excess cost of the provisions, fuel, &c., above the Halifax contract prices.

LORD FERMOY'S PLAN OF QUIETING IRELAND.

The following letter is in the "Dublin Freeman":—"Killboney, Restreer, Oct. 9.—Sir,—In your paper of yesterday's date you copy a letter of Lord Fermoy, addressed to the London Times, in which the writer offers to the public his advice on the subject of Fenianism. Lord Fermoy declared it to be his opinion that an overwhelming mass of the population of all Ireland, if not in numbers, yet certainly in effective strength, is upon the side of law and order as well as upon the side of British connection, and his lordship recommends, as the best remedy against Fenianism, that the people of Ireland be permitted to arm and train themselves as volunteers for the defence of their own country. It is just possible that I am mistaken in supposing Lord Fermoy to desire permission from England for the Irish people to arm and train themselves as citizen-soldiers for the defence of their own soil, just as if they—their lordship's fellow-countrymen—had rights all the same as if they were Englishmen or Scotchmen. It may be that it is only to a select few of his Irish fellow-countrymen his lordship proposes to give arms. Perhaps Lord Fermoy might regard even me as hardly so "well disposed," hardly so sincerely desirous for "preserving the lives and properties" of myself and my countrymen—as to be fit for being entrusted with arms. I remember that 25 years ago his views upon British connection were the same as mine were then and are still. We both desired that Ireland, under the same Sovereign as England and Scotland, should have her own independent Parliament and Government. We both were of opinion that the right way for settling the Church question, the land question, the education, and all the questions about Irish affairs that have agitated Ireland, and that now begin to frighten and endanger England, was by the free deliberation of the Lords and Commons of Ireland. Lord Fermoy may have changed his views since he was Mr. Burke Roche. But I say to him and the English, as I have never ceased to say to my fellow-countrymen, that there is no way of securing peace and prosperity for Ireland, and no way for saving England from the dangers that Fenianism will bring into England's next war with France of the United States, except that simple way of Repeal which is once tried in good company of travel.—I remain, sir, your most obedient servant.—JOHN MARTIN."

ONE OF THE LATEST TRICKS.

The ingenuity of the thieving fraternity would almost seem to be inexhaustible, for scarcely a week passes without the reading public being startled or amused by the revelations of some new dodge to circumvent the law of *meum et tuum*. Last week one of our Bolton shoe dealers was made the victim of a most daring, and yet a somewhat ingenious trick. A tall man, having the appearance of a member of one of the building trades, entered his shop, and desired to be shown a pair of shoes of the best quality. A pair was at once submitted to his inspection, but they were pronounced to be not quite good enough. He wanted a pair of the very best quality the tradesman had in his shop; the price was of not the slightest consequence. A pair was next reached from the shelf, which the tradesman pronounced to be equal to any that could be purchased in Bolton; the price was 24s. The man tried them on, and found them to be, as he expressed it, "just the ticket," therefore he would become the purchaser, keep them on his feet, and leave his old "leathers" to be repaired. Whilst the tradesman was on his knees, feeling at the new shoes, and satisfying that the fit was admirable, a fellow who had been loafing about the door for some minutes, rushed into the shop, and at one blow knocked the customer to the floor. The tradesman was almost panic-stricken; but the man who had been knocked down jumped to his feet in an instant, and started in pursuit of his assailant, who was tearing away at a rapid rate across the Market square. "My word," exclaimed the shoe dealer, as he rushed to the door to witness the chase, "but if he catches you ruffian he'll make him butch." The two men soon disappeared down Oxford Street, and they may be running yet for aught that is known to the contrary. Certain it is that the shoe dealer has never seen one or the other since, nor the color of his money.

On the night of the 31st ult., a number of boys were annoying the good people of Sydney, C. B., by knocking at doors, and other Hollow Eve practices, one of them named Campbell, was shot in the back by a bullet from a revolver, discharged by a man named Cameron, stage driver. Mr. Cameron says he aimed (as he thought) high enough for the ball to pass over the heads of the boys, as he only wished to frighten them. The affair is being investigated, and Cameron will be bound over for trial at the next term of the Supreme Court.

LOVE AND MADNESS.—A sad occurrence, resulting in the suicide of a young woman named Alice Scribner, took place at Kars, K. C., on the 1st inst. She had for some time been keeping company with a young man, named Abraham Pickett, of whose society her parents disapproved, and ineffectually exerted their influence to persuade her to break the connection. On the day named, the young man happening to call at the house of her parents, an altercation took place between him and her father, in the course of which the infuriated creature rushed from her home and threw herself into a pool near by, in which she perished before assistance could be rendered.—St. John News.
