Aircraft Delayed On Flight To S' side

Five large Lincoln aircraft that had been scheduled to arrive at Summerside on Wednesday afternoon on a specialist navigation flight from the R. A. F. Feud With Church Breaks Into Open In East Germany

BERLIN. (AP)—A simmering feud between the Communist regime and the church in Soviet East Germany broke into the open Thursday night and worried western pastors said an air of crisis has developed. Events of the last several weeks, including arrests and harsh jail terms for pastors in the East zone, drew the attention of top Protestant leaders meeting in West Berlin. The council received reports that the eastern regime has stepped up its drive to bend pastors to their political will. At least a dozen have been arrested during the last few weeks for preaching what the Communists regard as anti-state doctrine.

Eight American Newsmen To Visit Russia

LONDON. (AP)—The Kremlin lifted the Iron Curtain with a polite smile Thursday in approving visas for eight touring American newspaper and radio executives to visit Moscow. By-passing the usual red tape of the days of the late Prime Minister Stalin, the Soviet embassy stamped approval on the visit with apparently no qualms. The newspaper men and their tour manager, making a party of nine plan to fly to Moscow Monday by way of Vienna and Prague. The group, made up of news executives in smaller American cities and headed by James L. Wick, of the Niles, Ohio, Daily Times, has been interviewing heads of governments in Europe and the Middle East.

May Establish Pulp Mill In Labrador

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., (CP)—The Newfoundland legislature Thursday approved an agreement which could lead to the establishment of a new pulp mill in the rich Labrador hinterland. The agreement gives International Forest Products a New Brunswick syndicate, an option on 2,000 square miles of timberland around the watersheds of all rivers draining into Sandwich Bay. If the option is taken up the company will receive a 40-year lease and will be obliged to produce a minimum of 40,000,000 feet of sawn lumber and 15,000 cords of pulpwood each year. The province would receive a sliding scale of royalties, ranging from \$1 a cord on wood used in the mill to \$3.75 for wood exported in the unmanufactured state.

B.C. "Caretaker" Budget Voted

VICTORIA. (CP)—The British Columbia legislature Thursday voted a \$94,000,000 supply bill to maintain the province for the next six months. The "caretaker" budget was voted by agreement of all parties after the defeat of the Social Credit government Tuesday on its educational bill. Premier Bennett said he will ask for dissolution of the legislature early next week, and if it is granted an election will be held early in June.
