

Island Men Made Cleanup In Fox Awards At Fair

Mr. George Calbeck, Summerside, returns from the Maritime Winter Fair, in which he was a prominent exhibitor, with a formidable array of prizes including, a grand championship for female foxes in the 100% silver and the standard platinum classes. Mr. Calbeck went on to take the reserve championship female in the 100% silver and the reserve championship male in the pearl platinum. Other prizes consisted of one first in the "cup to 70% silver" class, three firsts in the 100% silver, two firsts in the standard platinum and five firsts in the pearl platinum. In addition to these the Summerside breeder had eight seconds and five thirds.

Another Islander who made a creditable showing was Mr. Clayton Hill of Kensington who took the male reserve championship in the 100% silver and in the standard platinum. Mr. Hill also had the championship female pearl platinum. He was the winner of three firsts, three seconds and five thirds.

The entry list at the fair was a large one with the most outstanding breeders in the Maritimes competing.

er luck with their junior male champion at Charlottetown. He was Pineview Treasurer, a son of Auchincrin Battle Flame, the grand champion at the Royal Win-

ter Fair last year for the Bompas herd of Quebec. He placed second in the class for junior yearlings here today to a bull that was bigger than him, with a good body but was faulted by most of the ring-side spectators for very poor feet.

Judge Carlyle Watt, of Lancaster, Ontario, said later that he figured he had probably made a mistake when the two animals came back into the Bailey Arena for the selection of the junior championship. The Oland bull is entered in the sale of steers at the Royal Winter Fair later this month.

Other Island showmen among the Ayrshire breeders today included George Bostwick of Frenchfort, with two thirds and a number of other strong placings in large classes that ran frequently to fifteen animals and sometimes more than that. Wallie Wood showed one animal from the herd of Alton Wood and Son, Marshfield, and placed second in a big class.

The MacRaes tied with the Boswells for the top honors for Island breeders. They had two firsts, a championship ribbon, three thirds, a fourth, fifth and a sixth. The Boswells had their junior championship, a first, four seconds, two thirds, as many fourths and a fifth and sixth.

W. A. Trueman and Son of Antic had one first place and they had to displace the grand champion cow last year at the Royal to get it. Their Prospect Blossom finally went to the top over Olands Glenzy Lou and thus achieved one of the major accomplishments of the day. It was a popular win for the popular Antic man and his young sons.

The Boswell junior champion heifer is sired by Leichenrois Gay champion was bred on their Lealand Farm at Victoria and is out of the cow Dolly Dale Vida.

The veteran Jersey breeder, Edison B. Mutch of North River, P. E. I., was holding a slight edge in the

race for premier Jersey exhibitor here tonight at the Maritime Winter Fair with a little more than one-half the classes completed for the breed. But the competition was so keen that he had not established any appreciable margin of safety as the upwards of twenty breeders groomed their remaining entries for the final classes tomorrow.

Mr. Mutch won three firsts and one of them was taken by Jesters Standard Dreamer, his senior herd sire that went grand champion at the Royal Winter Fair last year. The Dreamer went senior and grand champion here today. Mr. Mutch also had a pair of blue ribbons, a third, four fourths and a sixth for his day's work.

Freddie Kitson, a newcomer to the fair here, walked off with the reserve junior male championship this forenoon with his Wetkumling Oscars Jester, a junior yearling. The junior championship went to Malcolm Mackay's Mariu Advancer Crusader from his Highlow herd at Hampton, N. B. The reserve senior and reserve grand ribbons went to Campbell Really Royal owned by Charles Robinson and Son of Harver Station, N.B.

Kitson had a good percentage for the day, he took only two animals to the fair. One won his class and the other placed fourth in a very heavy and very strong class.

Doug Matheson of Forest Hill was the other Island Jersey exhibitor here today. He placed third with the only animal he showed.

Mr. Mutch won the senior yearling heifer class this afternoon with Rivernorth Renas Dora and the two year old dry class with Dreamers Golden Lass 1F.

Other very strong Jersey showmen today were Charles Robinson and Son with three firsts including two reserve championships, four seconds and a number of other placings. Sterling Brown of Har-

vey Station, N. B., also had three first place ribbons. The Punny Jersey Farm had two, Malcolm Mackay had one, M. H. Lister, Harvey Station and the N. B. Protestant Orphanage at Lancaster had another.

Fine Production Record
George MacMillan of Cornwall was in the stands this afternoon and was witness to the fact that showing standards do not always agree with production records. George was particularly interested in the class for dry cows five years old and over. He was watching Rivernorth Pansy 2nd, an animal he had bought from Edison Mutch when she was a week old and had sold this year to Malcolm Mackay of Hampton, N. B., after seeing her develop into an excellent cow and win a medal of merit with plenty of production to spare, the cow produced 820 pounds of butterfat from 15,000 lbs. of milk in 305 days, the record is not official yet so the figures are approximate but they are high enough to indicate the worth of the animal that made them. She averaged 49.5 lbs. of milk per day for the 305 days and milked forty-three lbs. on the last day of her test. Yet this grand producer placed third today in a class of three cows.

She is sired by Brave Phinas Oscar and is out of Maids Pansy. Edison Mutch's several lines grand champion cow that won the honor most recently at Charlottetown in August. She shows in the cow-in-milk class tomorrow morning.

The junior female champion today was Manawa Spotlight Basil Ruby owned by the N. B. Protestant Orphan Home. The reserve was Mr. Robinson's Campbell Sabra, a junior yearling heifer. The champion was a senior calf.

Mink Show
B. B. Jones of Banbury, P. E. I., Island, cleaned up all of the

championships in the classes for Stewart mink at Maritime Winter Fair today but he and other Island exhibitors had tough going in some of the other classes. Jones, the biggest winner at the fair a year ago, took the male and female grand championship for Stewarts; he also had the champion Breath of Spring platinum female mink. Will and E. Kenny of Atwoods Brooks, N. S., shared the championship honors in the natural darks John McInnis had the male and grand champion mink in platinum silverblues.

The female champion was shown by Don Urquhart of West Bay, N.S. The male and grand champion Breath of Spring platinum were shown by Mr. McInnis. The Kennys shared the championship honors in the white mink. Will had the champion male and Earl the female and grand champion. The mink are being placed by Walter Murray of Montreal.

Horses
Lorne Ferguson of Fergusons Percheron stallion Major Lamel, stole the show here this afternoon in the Percheron section of the registered draft horse exhibition. The beautiful big dappled grey stallion took his class and won the senior and grand championship. On top of that he won many a complimentary comment and attracted many an admiring glance from horse lovers along the sidelines. Mr. Ferguson placed second with his yearling filly Lillie Belle. He also placed second on the progeny of dam class with Major Lamel and Lillie Belle. They are both out of Lillie May, a mare whose dam was Maybelle of Sunnycroft.

Robert Chappel of York ran into stiff competition and placed fourth in a class of eleven with his fine Clydesdale mare Mary Eclipse.
