

## Admits Government Allows Year-Round Deer Hunting

TORONTO (CP) — Dr. W. J. Karkness, chief of the Ontario government's division of fish and wildlife, admitted Wednesday the government permits year-round hunting on two Ontario islands owned by wealthy United States citizens. He identified them as Duck Island in Lake Ontario, owned by J.S. State Secretary Dulles, and Griffiths Island in Georgian Bay, owned by the Frigidair division of General Motors Corporation. "The practice started 25 years ago," Dr. Karkness said "and because it's recognized as a long established practice, we've never bothered to look into it."

Ross Whicher, Liberal member of the Ontario legislature for Bruce, said Tuesday in the legislature there are four areas in Ontario owned by men of wealth where hunting laws are violated.

**FISH AND FOWL**

"Duck Island is primarily noted for bass fishing," said Dr. Karkness. "Griffiths Island is a nesting ground for thousands of pheasants."

"In 1931 or '32 the owners of the island apparently stocked the terrain with imported deer and the understanding since then has been they can shoot when they choose."

Meanwhile Robert Hart, agent for Mr. Dulles, said the Duck Island estate, 20 miles south of Kingston, always has been licensed as a private preserve.

"There are plenty of Canadian deer there, but I have never known Mr. Dulles to shoot one," he said.

## Denies Company Using Island For Year-Round Deer Hunting

OSHAWA, Ont. (CP)—A spokesman for General Motors of Canada Wednesday denied a statement by Ross M. Whicher, Liberal member of the Ontario legislature for Bruce, that his company was using Griffiths Island in Georgian Bay for year-round deer hunting.

Mr. Whicher told the legislature Tuesday the provincial government was permitting United States residents to hunt on the island where there was no open season on deer. He said the island was registered under a large U.S. corporation — the Frigidair division of General Motors. He said his information came from the Ontario department of lands and forests.

The GM spokesman said: "Griffiths Island for many years had been owned and operated as a private hunting club by a member of Canadian citizens. Three years ago the four GM subsidiaries in Canada purchased the island as a location for a new training school for members of our division, primarily foremen, in our Canadian plants."

**HUNTING IS INCIDENTAL**

"Whatever hunting is done on the island is incidental to the real purpose of GM subsidiaries in Canada in purchasing the property."

Mr. Whicher said many deer were shot last year on the island but county residents would be fined or imprisoned if caught hunting deer out of season.

The spokesman said "GM has confirmed strictly to all rules and regulations of the Ontario department of lands and forests and obviously will continue to do so."

## Club Manager Worries About Influence On World Affairs

VANCOUVER (CP) — Henry Goldsmith worried today about his possible influence on world conditions.

The manager of the Point Grey Golf and Country Club here, Goldsmith has received — and accepted — an offer to be matre d'hôtel for the three-power conferences in Bermuda next month. "It's terribly worrying, catering for such people," Mr. Goldsmith said. "You never know how you may upset one of them by serving the wrong food."

It will not be a new experience when he handles food arrangements for President Eisenhower and Prime Ministers St. Laurent and Macmillan.

"I catered for a big three conference in Bermuda in 1953 and there was a crisis when Sir Winston Churchill wanted whitefish and we hardly had time to untawh them."

"Eisenhower loves steaks and vanilla ice cream, hamburgers and typically American food. Mr. St. Laurent is very easy to cater for. As for Mr. Macmillan—well, but I expect will be told about any particular dislikes before the conferences start.

"They'll want meals at all peculiar times of day and they must be ready exactly to the minute."

Mr. Goldsmith, now 43, was trained in London, Paris and Rome hotels. He worked at the Mid-Ocean Club in Bermuda before moving on to Calgary and, finally, to Vancouver 18 months ago.

The request was sent by Sir Howard Trott of the Bermuda House of Assembly, who had invited Mr. Goldsmith back for the 1953 conference.

## Bert Bell And Cooper Agree Differences Can Be Overcome

PHILADELPHIA (CP) — Two Canadian and American professional football chiefs commended together Wednesday and then emerged with a message of peace.

"There is no major difference between us that we can't iron out," said Ralph Cooper of Hamilton, president of the Canadian Football Council.

"Amen," said Bert Bell, in his shortest speech since becoming commissioner of the National Football League.

It wasn't always this way. The NFL battled the Canadian leagues for several years over the rights of each side to raid the other for alleged raiding.

**ONE WRANGLE LEFT**

Cooper, who journeyed here to pay a surprise visit on Bell described 1956 as a year of "very fine co-operation." Bell nodded agreement.

The Canadian who owns part of Hamilton Tiger-Cats in the Big Four league, and Sydney Halter of Winnipeg, commissioner of the Western Interprovincial Football Union, were delegated at the CFC meeting Jan. 29 to work out a peace pact with Bell.

Bell and Cooper agreed there is only one "major" wrangle over a player at present. This concerns Don Owen, Mississippi Southern tackle signed by both Pittsburgh Steelers and Montreal Alouettes. Bell said Art Rooney of the Steelers and Leo Dandurand of Montreal would sit down and try to iron it out.

**NO RAIDING SEEN**

Cooper said that in 1956 there were "one or two problems, but nothing we couldn't iron out over the telephone. As far as I know there was no raiding, no case of player raiding. We honored each other's contracts and options."

Bell concurred.

Cooper thanked Bell for his help over the last five years to the Canadian leagues. The organizational procedure adopted by the Canadians was patterned after the NFL's.

He expressed hope that in future NFL and Canadian teams might meet in exhibition games as Ottawa Rough Riders and New York Giants did in 1952.

## International Baseball Loop Begins Schedule April 15th

MONTREAL (CP) — The International Baseball League will begin its 74th season April 15 — earliest start since 1933 — with Montreal Royals facing Cuban Sugar Kings at Havana.

The other six clubs get into it two days later for the usual 154-game schedule concluding Sept. 8.

Toronto is at Miami, Rochester at Richmond and Buffalo at Columbus with northern openers May 1 between the same pairings.

The league, oldest minor one in baseball, is a stand-pat circuit in membership for the first time since 1953. There have been some other changes.

Morie Silver heads a community group acquiring the Rochester franchise from St. Louis Cardinals and radio station owner George B. Storer bought up the Miami membership.

Columbus has switched its working agreement from Kansas City to the Pittsburgh chain and Buffalo, independent last year, has hooked on with Philadelphia.

**NEW MANAGERS**

Three clubs have new managers. Dixie Walker, succeeded at Rochester by Cot Deal, has gone to the pennant-winning Toronto Maple Leafs to replace Bruno Betzel. Frank Ocek, veteran Pittsburgh Pirate farm manager, succeeds Nick Cullop of Columbus.

Meanwhile, said President Frank Shaughnessy, the triple-A league hopes for even better attendance this year than the 1,344,660 attracted last year. That was tops in minor league attendance. The American League drew 1,665,693 and the Pacific Coast 1,664,963.

Montreal Royals, perhaps taking a leaf from the parent Brooklyn Dodgers, will play out-of-town home games this year, all at Quebec, against each of the seven league opponents.

Marie, Mich., team. Pittsburgh was the fourth team in that loop which gave up at the end of the 1906 season.

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## Aragon Denies Attempting 'Fix'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Third-ranking welterweight Art Aragon denied again from the witness stand Wednesday that he ever offered boxer Dick Goldstein \$500 to throw a fight in Texas.

But under questioning by his attorney and manager, Paul Caruso, Aragon said he did tell Goldstein before a scheduled fight in San Antonio to "go down and stay down."

"I frequently tell my opponents that," Aragon said. "I told Goldstein under no circumstances should he try to be a hero. 'I do not like to hurt fighters. I told Goldstein that many times.'"

Aragon said he had used Goldstein as a sparring partner many times. But he said this would not make it easy for Goldstein to solve Aragon's boxing style.

"Sometimes, with sparring partners with whom I have been fighting for as long as seven years I tell them I am going to throw a right and then hit them with it," Aragon said.

"To be a sparring partner is not always beneficial."

Goldstein an unranked welterweight claims Aragon offered him the \$500 to take a fourth-round dive in a 10-round fight scheduled for Dec. 18 in San Antonio. The fight was cancelled when Aragon turned up with a fever.

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**BIRTH IN AIRLINER**

VIENNA (Reuters)—Mrs. Fritzi Fagl, 24, wife of an official of the Austrian Institute in London, gave birth to a baby boy Tuesday aboard an airliner in flight from London to Vienna. The child was born nearly 90 minutes before the plane was due to land here. Mother and baby both are well.
