A Slander Corrected.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—A meeting of the inhabitants of
County Line Station and vicinity was held
in the schoolroom on Saturday evening, 14th
inst., agreeable to a notice posted for that
purpose.

The notice calling the meeting was signed
by J. W. Hughes, Peter Duffy, and
Wm. Haslam, Esq's., stating that such
meeting was called for the purpose of cor-
recting certain slanders published in THE
WEEKLY EXAMINER newspaper, over the
signature of "Malsah," dated 2nd October,
1882, said falsehoods circulated for the
purpose of throwing discredit on the village
and people.

The meeting was organized by the ap-
pointment of Patrick Duffy, Esq., to the
Chair, and the undersigned Secretary.

The village and adjacent settlements was
fairly represented at the meeting.

J. W. Hughes, Esq., first addressed the
meeting, beginning by reading the libellous
article signed "Malsah" and commenting
keenly on such base cowardly falsehoods,
reflecting on, and libelling the licensed
vendor, and people of "his place," as they
did. He (Mr. Hughes) proposed the fol-
lowing resolution which was seconded by
John T. Murphy, Esq., Newton, and carried
unanimously:

Whereas, The letter signed "Malsah," in
the WEEKLY EXAMINER of 3rd inst., was
both libellous and malicious in its ungrounded
allegations to the licensed vendor of this vil-
lage, and the people generally of this locality;
and, whereas, it is a well known fact that
the vendor of this place is most strict, selling
only as directed by the law. Hence, his fit-
ness to act as vendor here, rather than place
the sale of liquors in other hands, as appears
to be the desire of "Malsah," and a few
others.

Therefore Resolved, That this meeting
strongly condemns the cowardly and untruthful
slanders of "Malsah." The more because
we believe him to be an unworthy member of
a Temperance Division, leagued with a cer-
tain few, with a view that the vendibility may
be given to another less strict in observing
the provisions of the Scott Act.

Peter Duffy, Esq., next addressed the
meeting, warmly criticizing the foul slan-
ders of "Malsah," as just read from THE
EXAMINER of the 3rd inst. He (Mr.
Duffy) argued that "Malsah's" wanton
slanders reflected equally on the people as
well as the vendor, and both without any
reason. He congratulated the people on
having so strict a vendor, and was pleased
to note so becoming a change in use of
liquor in this locality. He moved the fol-
lowing resolution, which was seconded by
Mr. Peter McMahon, and carried without
even one nay.

Whereas, It is to be regretted that we have
some few persons in our midst whose highest
ambition is to belittle and belittle the place they
live in, together with a respectable community
for unworthy purposes; and

Whereas, This meeting is proud to be able
to testify to the strict manner and means
adopted by the Vendor at this place, under
the Scott Act.

Therefore Resolved, That this meeting desire
THE EXAMINER newspaper to publish this our
expression of opinion in contradiction of the
false slanders of "Malsah," which we believe
was unduly thrust into the columns of that
paper by a party lacking truth and further
backing the concurrence of any respectable or
responsible person in this vicinity.

The Vendor being present, thanked the
Meeting for their putting down such base
charges, and said he never sold at any
time, other quantity than specified in
Doctor's certificates and would in future, as
he had done in the past, sail under the
protection of the law. Messrs J. McMahon,
J. J. Murphy, J. Duffy, and others spoke,
all condemning "Malsah's" untruthful
letter, others said that the foul letter was
got up to deceive the public in the matter
of violating the Scott Act. Hence its
greater baseness, coming as it did from a
source affecting to be in sympathy with
Temperance.

A vote of thanks was tendered the Chair-
man when the meeting broke up impressed
with the idea that slanderers will not
venture so foul an undertaking again.

The Robbery Case.

Evidence for the Defence.

TUESDAY, Oct. 17.

CHARLES LEIGH (sworn)—Examined by
Mr. Davies—I live in Mr. Peake's brick
house, Water Street. I remember the
night of the robbery. I was standing talk-
ing to the watchman. I remember Albert
Carvell leaving the office that night. It
was about twenty minutes past eleven. My
watch showed about twenty minutes to
twelve, but it was fast. This night Mr.
Carvell passed without saying "good
night," as usual. I thought this singular
after I heard of the robbery. I went
home about twelve o'clock. I saw no sus-
picious characters prowling about. I didn't
see a soul.

Cross-examined by Mr. McLeod—I re-
called the time Mr. Carvell passed the fol-
lowing evening. I met him about five
minutes of the seven at from nine to half-
past eleven. Generally he leaves a little
after ten o'clock. I have no stated time to
walk on the platform. I am generally
about the corner at half-past nine, and
might be there any time from eight to
twelve o'clock. I meet Livingston every
night. I should not have remembered the
time Mr. Carvell passed on that Thursday
night but for hearing of the robbery. It
is not possible it was twenty minutes to
eleven. I saw Mr. Carvell pass. I couldn't
swear that Mr. Carvell heard me when I
spoke to him that night. Usually he does
and answers. He is usually later on the
boat nights.

ARTHUR NEWBERY (sworn)—Examined
by Mr. Davies—I am Assistant Provincial
Secretary. I pay the salaries of the Pro-
vincial officials. I paid Blatch his monthly
salary either on the 2nd of September,
1882, or on the 1st or 2nd of September.
I paid him \$41.66 by cheque. I also paid
him some money for Dawson. I paid him
\$50 between the 4th and the 9th of Sep-
tember. I also remember paying two other
small cheques—one drawn by Mr. Kant
and one by Mr. Mitchell. Kant's cheque
was for \$7.50—the amount of Mitchell's
cheque I don't remember.

To Mr. McLeod—The \$50 were due
Doirant for his salary as Assistant Clerk of
the County Court. Doirant gave an order
to Blatch to get the money. The amount
Doirant owed the Government was less
than the amount drawn by Blatch. I don't
know whether Doirant was dismissed or
whether he resigned. I don't remember
paying the small cheque to Blatch; but I
paid him to some body and got value for
them. I paid Mr. Blatch both the salary
and the amount due Doirant by cheque.
Blatch has to account to the Government
for all County Court fees.

MICHAEL FOLEY (sworn)—Examined by
Mr. Davies—I am a tenant of Mr. Blatch
and pay him \$128 a year.

To Mr. McLeod—I pay him quarterly.
The quarters are August, November,
February and May. The last rent I paid
was on the 11th August. I paid \$31.88.
The house belongs to Blatch as far as I
know. He bought it from Weeks I believe.

H. C. OUTERBRIDGE (sworn)—Examined
by Mr. Davies—I remember the night
Blatch was arrested. Mr. Dawson was
that evening talking to John Stumbles in
his shop about the robbery. He turned to
me and asked me if I was accustomed to
greenbacks and said "Have you ever seen a
Silver Dollar Note?" I told him "yes" and
that my attention was drawn to one the day
I left New York. I told him such a note
would have "twenty" printed across each
end of it. He said this was exactly the
kind of note I got from Blatch. (The \$20
note was here produced.) This is a National
Currency Note. I call it a greenback. It's
not the kind I described to him and which
he said was the kind he had received from
Blatch.

To Mr. McLeod—After I had described
it he said he didn't know that he had ever
seen one like it before the note in question.
He said he got a twenty dollar note from
Blatch. He said something on that occa-
sion about the note having pencil marks
upon it. He said some one (I don't know
who) held it up to the light and it had
pencil marks upon it. I didn't hear him
say how many greenbacks he received from
Blatch.

ALBERT H. LOVE (sworn)—Examined by
Mr. Davies—I live in Mr. Blatch's house
on Oiebar Street. Mrs. Dr. Fraser lives
in the other half of it. We both pay \$68 a
year.

To Mr. McLeod—We pay per quarters
ending the 10th April, 10th July, 10th
October and 10th January. I pay in cash.

FREDERICK W. HUGHES (recalled), exam-
ined by Mr. Davies—Produces the Cash
Book. The amount I paid Blatch was
\$243.00. Blatch repaid me \$50 on the 2nd
of September last. Returns of County
Courts produced. Mr. Blatch accounted to
the Government on the 4th of May,
1882, and the 16th of October, 1882—
(paper produced.) This is a return for the
Town Circuit (of which Mr. Blatch is
Clerk) and the money was paid on the 4th
of May, the amount paid was \$111.35.
Blatch has made a return for his circuit
since the 27th of December, 1881. He re-
turned \$179.00 on the 16th of October.
This was for fees received up to the 27th of
March, 1882. The \$172 I paid Blatch was
made up of Government fees and money
paid in by suitors. Almost immediately
after the August Court was over, Mr.
Blatch went out and collected a substantial
amount of fees. When he returned, he
put a large roll of notes into his cash box.
I am not sure of the amount. He also re-
ceived between August Court and the time
of his arrest, from the Assistant Clerks:

From New London \$30 53
From Bonshaw 25 28
From Belfast 24 43

Total \$80 24

I don't know that an entry is made of the
amounts Blatch receives from the Assistant
Clerks. When he has the returns he has
