

### Is Surprised By Canadian Artists

OTTAWA (CP)—A New York curator and critic has discovered that vital and mature work is emerging from the brushes and palettes of contemporary Canadian artists.

Andrew Ritchie, chief curator for the New York Museum of Modern Art, Tuesday said he is surprised to find a vitality, variety and maturity in post-war Canadian painting.

The United States "tends to be rather ignorant of Canadian painting," Mr. Ritchie told a press conference. But there was no need to be conceding about contemporary Canadian art.

"What excites me," he said, "is that Canada's post-war art is not provincial and no longer just pictorial."

Mr. Ritchie Monday got his first extensive look at Canadian painting produced within the last 10 years. Along with Jean Simard, Montreal art critic and teacher, and director Alan Jarvis of the National Gallery, he helped select 45 paintings for showing at the gallery's biennial exhibition of Canadian art.

The exhibition, held to show contemporary Canadian art to Canadians, opens April 3 in Ottawa and is to tour Canada after a month's showing here.

### Fail To Get Reply On Who Is To Pay In Flour Price Cuts

OTTAWA (CP)—Opposition members failed Monday to get an immediate reply from the government as to who will pay for the new wheat board price adjustment plan to reduce the price of Canadian flour to certain importing countries.

John Dickey, parliamentary assistant to Trade Minister Howse, said, however, that the plan is aimed at meeting competition chiefly from the United States and Australia in world flour markets.

Mervyn Johnson (CCF—Kinsmen) asked whether the plan means "Canadian farmers again are being asked to subsidize the millers."

Mr. Dickey, replying to opposition questions, said Mr. Howse's absence, said he would take the question under consideration for a later reply.

The wheat board announced Friday that it will subsidize flour exports except those going to the United Kingdom and European countries at a rate of three to eight cents a bushel. It would do so by charging millers that much less for milling wheat.

**TWO-PRICE SYSTEM**

Douglas Harkness (PC—Calgary North) asked to what extent the adjustments will put Canadian millers in a position to compete with U.S. millers and to what extent this move means "the institution of a two-price system for wheat and flour in Canada."

Mr. Dickey said the policy "is definitely a break with tradition. It has been reluctantly adopted by the board because of similar practices in other countries." The board reserved the right to cancel it at any time without notice.

He noted that exports of Canadian wheat as flour amount to about 40,000,000 bushels a year. Some flour went to countries that also import wheat and in these countries the amount of Canadian flour bought was largely determined by its quality.

But there also were a large number of tropical and semi-tropical countries that had no milling industry of their own and were entirely dependent on imports for their flour supplies.

The wheat board had been watching these markets for some time as they became increasingly competitive.
