Opposition Leader Pearson moved a motion of non-confidence in the government demanding that a special Commons committee be appointed immediately to investigate and report on all matters connected with the Malton expropriation case.

CALM IN HURRICANE
Mr. Pallett appeared like the calm eye of the hurricane. He spoke in a quiet and firm voice, a sharp contrast to the government-opposition exchange of insults and shouting in the last 18 days.

In his comparatively brief statement, Mr. Pallett maintained he had only been acting in the best interests of his constituents and that he had sought or received any personal gain.

J.W. Pickersgill (L-Bonaville-Twilligate) congratulated Mr. Pallett for the "tone" of his

"modest statement" and said the MP for Peel had every right to promote the honest interests of his constituents.

But, Mr. Pickersgill said, all doubts had been removed. Why, he asked, if there had been a misunderstanding between Mr. Pallett and Mr. Hees, had one of Mr. Pallett's constituents been permitted to take the evaluation case to the Exchequer Court.

Mrs. Aileen Drew asked the Exchequer Court to approve Mr. Clare's valuation of \$17,300 on her property. The court rejected the claim and approved one for \$11,200, which had been the last offer of the transport department.

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CNR Sleeping Car Service To Be Restored For Summer

MONCTON—Sleeping car service between Charlottetown and Montreal will be restored on a test basis this summer, the CNR announced here yesterday. George Stiven, general passenger agent in the Atlantic Region, said a principal reason for the company's decision was a desire to give all possible aid to Prince Edward Island's tourist industry.

At the same time, Mr. Stiven said the summer service this year is in the nature of an experiment. Whether it will operate in 1960 will depend on patronage this summer.

It was emphasized that restoration of the sleeper between June 26 and Sept. 9 is a temporary measure only, while the tourist season is in full swing. Mr. Stiven said return of the sleeper for this summer in no way represents a reversal of a company decision last October to discontinue the Charlottetown-Montreal service because of lack of patronage.

On the summer schedules this year, the first trip to Montreal will be made June 29, and the first to Charlottetown from Montreal will leave there Sept. 7 and the last one from Charlottetown Sept. 9.
