FINANCIAL AID

Doctor Jean Nelson Memorial Awards

This award assists recipients to pursue graduate study related to community health. It is particularly intended to provide opportunity to study in fields related to services to youth. Value is \$3,000. Deadline: May 15.

\$7,500 awarded

from graduate work directly related to external communications services. Tenable in Canada.

Deadline: February 1.
Emergency Planning Canada Research Fellowship

\$7,000 per annum plus tuition and compulsory fees, for research on human behavior under stress focusing on

reactions of groups in natural, technological, industrial, and other disasters, and the delivery of emergency services to victims in community wide crisis situations.

Tenable to a maximum of four years. Deadline: February 1.

Language and the University

Maxwell F. Yalden, Commissioner of Official Languages, Canada, will deliver a public lecture at the University of Prince Edward Island on Friday, November 27, at 8:00 p.m. Mr. Yalden will speak on "Language and the University: Luxury or Necessity?" It will take place in the Robertson Library Lecture Theatre.

A native of Toronto, Mr. Yalden received his B.A. from Victoria College, University of Toronto in 1952. He attended the University of Paris for one year, and then took

graduate studies in philosophy at the University of Michigan, receiving his M.A. in 1954 and his Ph.D. in 1956. He then joined the Department of External Affairs and, following Russian Language Studies at Cambridge University, he was posted to Moscow. In 1960, he served on the Canadian delegation for the Geneva Conference on Disarmament. For the next three years he was with the Department's Disarmament Division in Ottawa. He was posted to the Canadian Embassy in Paris as First Secretary in 1963, and became Counsellor there in 1965. He returned to Ottawa as special assistant on federal-provincial ques-

tions to the Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs. From 1969 to 1973 he served as Assistant Under-Secretary of State in the Department of the Secretary of State in charge of official languages and post-secondary education programs.

He served as Deputy Minister of Communications from 1973 to 1977 at which time he was appointed Commissioner of Official Languages for a term of seven years.

Although Mr. Yalden's address is a part of the Fifth Annual Meeting of the Atlantic Provinces Linguistic Association, the public is welcome to attend.

The Bradfield Graduate Fellowships

\$15,500 per annum
