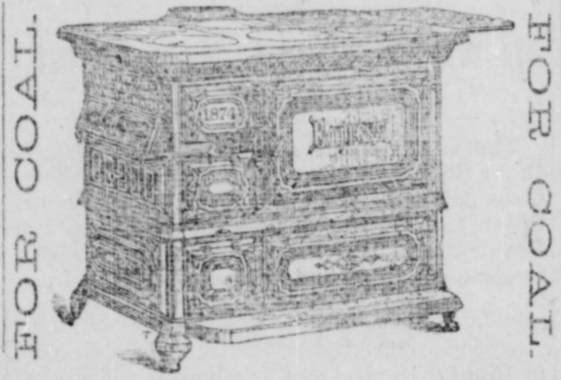

### Inspectors.

### The Winter Port.

MESSRS. CUNARD AND COMPANY give the Halifax Chronicle a rap over the knuckles for having conveyed the erroneous impression throughout the country that the Allan mail steamers will not land Canadian cargo at Halifax. They say that Canadian goods for the Upper Provinces will be brought out by the mail steamers via Halifax or Boston, as the consignees of the goods may direct, the rates of freight by either route being the same.

#### WHAT THEY SAY OF IT.

(From the Farmer's Advocate for November.)

A very successful exhibition was held in Charlottetown, at which nearly all the magistrates of Prince Edward Island attended, and several from the other Maritime Provinces. Professor Sheldon and Mr. Sparrow, two English delegates, were also present. A dinner was provided, and a pleasant and profitable time was spent, with speeches, &c. These are the right kind of exhibitions to encourage, and much valuable information is often obtained at such gatherings. We think that Ontario has a pattern to follow in many respects when we look at the small isolated Island, and yet we must acknowledge, from personal observation made during the past summer, we consider that the Islanders are a better average class of farmers than those of Ontario. They are careful, loyal and honorable. We saw more green hedges on this Island than we have seen in Ontario. Their land may not on the whole be as fertile, but there is greater care taken, and some of the farms we saw on this Island would compare favorably with the best we have seen in Ontario. When we enquired into the public expenditures we found that real, live, active farmers had the control of them; and the public services was in most instances performed by officers, not, as in Ontario, for the purpose of making all the gold capital they can and all the political power they can obtain, no matter at what sacrifice to the interests of the farmers or the country. In P. E. Island the leaders in agricultural matters have labored for honor and to do good to the country, and their services are paid for, not by the revenue in cash drawn from the farmers, as our expensive and cumbersome Board of Agriculture is paid, but by the thanks and gratitude of all well-wishers of agriculture.

The Island has a Government Stock Farm, the total cost of which, we are informed, was the small sum of about \$1,500 last year. They raise a number of Shorthorn cattle, and send them to the different counties to sell for what they will bring. Thus they are doing good service. The farm is well cultivated, and is a great credit to the Island, to the directors, and to the manager. They are all active working people that have anything to do with it.

The English delegates, Mr. Sparrow and Professor Sheldon, expressed themselves much pleased and much astonished at the extent and fertility of our Dominion, and particularly with P. E. Island and inhabitants. They enjoyed themselves better during the five days they had spent on the Island than any other time spent on this continent.

Mr. A. Simpson addressed the meeting. He said that he had visited nine of the United States, and was not afraid to say that little P. E. Island possessed more essentials of comfort than any of them. We coincide with Mr. Simpson's remarks, and would say to any of our friends who have time and means, and desire to know anything about the pleasures of breathing a cool and pleasant air, and enjoying a pleasant climate, fresh green hedges and country, just go down that Canadian Gem of the Sea, and if you cannot live and enjoy yourself for a few weeks on that Island in the summer time, you need not hunt around this earth any longer for comfort or pleasure.

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GOLD IN NOVA SCOTIA.—A solid piece of gold, weighing 77 oz. and estimated to be worth \$1,300, taken from a small boulder found on the farm of William Bruce, Cariboo, Upper Musquodoboit, N. S., was sent into Halifax on the 16th inst. One of the gold mining properties owned by the late Alexander Heatherington at Cariboo, East Halifax, was sold by the Sheriff on the 16th, for \$4,600. The property includes 67 gold mining areas, 100 acres of land and buildings and machinery.

LEFURGEY, who was sentenced to life imprisonment for forgery, made an offer to the penitentiary authorities the other day which the Warden could not accept. It appears that a number of the convicts were engaged in blasting rock at the water-works. A blast was about to be put off, when Lefurgey stepped up and offered to sit on the blast as it went off if they would allow him his liberty thereafter, dead or alive.—Sackville Transcript.

THE Caledonian Club Annual Dinner, will be held at the Rankin House, on the 30th inst. All clergymen of Scottish descent in the City will, we learn, be invited.

MR. MURDOCK BUCHANAN, of Point Prim cut and made on Tuesday last, 16th November, three tons of marsh hay. This is we believe unprecedented.

## MARKETS.

OATS the past week have sold at prices ranging from 42 to 44 cents. But even these good prices have not created a rush—the fine weather having induced farmers, generally, to remain at their fall ploughing. The top price to-day is 42 cents, and we anticipate a further decline. In Liverpool oats still sell at 6s. 2d. per cental.

THERE is little or no movement in barley.

POTATOES sell at prices ranging from 12 to 15 cents. This is too bad.

On enquiry, we find one dealer buying at the average rate of three hundred carcasses per week, while another is buying on an average, fifty barrels per day. Prices range from 4½ to 6½—the first being paid for very light, and the last for extra good and heavy.

The egg market is quiet. In Montreal the prices are 18c @ 19c per dozen. The Boston market is very firm, Canadian fresh eggs having been sold there at 25c @ 26c per dozen.

### Clippings From Late Papers.

The Hamburg-American line steamer Silesia, Captain Albers, from Hamburg, sailed from Havre for New York, taking 2,300,000f, gold.

The members of the Albanian League at Sentari continue favorable to the cession of Dulcigno, but the chief of the league raises difficulties in the way of carrying the plan to fulfillment.

The Popolo Romano, of Rome, states that the Italian revenue receipts for the present financial year will show a surplus of at least 10,000,000 lire, as compared with the final budget estimates.

The Sportsman says the bets on the Hanlan-Triekett match represent in the aggregate a far greater sum than was ever dependent on a boat race. It is expected that Toronto men alone will draw in fully \$200,000.

Five elections for the House of Commons are now pending, viz. Quebec county, Bagot, Montmorency, Joliette, and North Oxford. It is thought improbable that the Opposition will contest any except the last named constituency.

The "Republique Francaise" says:—"The Chamber of Deputies was right, both in giving priority to the Magistracy bill, urgency for which is becoming more and more apparent, and in expressing its sincere desire for co-operation in the work, still to be accomplished, of the men who have so bravely withstood the clerical insurrection."

The birth of the Spanish Princess has been celebrated by King Alfonso by conferring upon a number of persons at Havana titles and decorations. Among the latter Senor Don Carlos Saladrigas, vice president of the Board of the Liberal Party, has received the Grand Cross of the Order of Isabella Catholica.

A despatch from St. Petersburg to the "Daily News" says:—"The Russian answer to the late Chinese concessions has been formulated, so that the Russian stipulations are now definitely known, and, with a mutual disposition to arrange matters amicably it can hardly be supposed that the demands for the reimbursements of the expenses of the Russian Pacific squadron can fail to be satisfactorily disposed of."

The New York Herald remarks:—"Our laboring population might learn a lesson in economy from the Chinese in San Francisco, if we are to judge from the statements made in an extract we publish from a California paper. This much abused but industrious class invariably live within their income, always saving something for the rainy day that comes to so many. Yet none of them ever heard of Benjamin Franklin or "Poor Richard's Maxims."
