Montague School Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the ratepayers of Montague School was held in the school on Tuesday night with Mr. S. S. Hessian, K.C., as chairman. The minutes of the last meeting were read by Mr. Lester MacLeod, secretary of the Board. Mr. Carl Boehner, chairman of the trustees, presented the trustees' report concerning the activities relating to the school, and made the following recommendations: Owing to the large enrollment, and consequent overcrowding, he proposed that a new room be constructed that a drink fountain be installed on the first floor for the convenience of the students on that floor. The financial report presented a very successful year regarding the activities in the school. The Inspectors' report also reported the construction of an extra room, drinking fountain, new seats for the classroom, and the placing of more maps in the classrooms. Mr. A. D. MacLure was reappointed auditor. In the discussion re supplements it was moved and seconded that an amount up to \$1000.00 be placed in the estimates as an addition to the present supplement amount. It was also moved and seconded that a new room be constructed to alleviate the overcrowding. An amount of \$3500.00 was voted for general expenses. The new trustees appointed are Mr. S. S. Hessian, K.C., and Mr. Charles Fraser, who with Mr. Lorne Wigginton will complete the Board. Mrs. St. Clair Trainor resigned this year owing to departure to take up residence in Charlottetown. At the Domestic Animals Act meeting which immediately followed, Messrs. Sam Reid, Les MacDonald and Russell MacGregor were reappointed to enforce the Act.

Georgetown and Vicinity

The annual school meeting of the Georgetown School District No. 1, was held in the Town Hall on Tuesday, June 27, at 7 p.m., with twenty-one members present. Mr. S. C. Knight was appointed chairman for the meeting. The first order of business was the reading by school secretary, Mrs. W. W. MacLaren, of the minutes of the last annual meeting and their adoption. The annual trustees' report was given verbally by chairman of the School Board, Mr. A. H. Stewart. This report was adopted. A letter from the Superintendent of Education, Dr. L. W. Shaw, was read by the secretary. Following the reading of this letter a motion was passed, to the effect that no action be taken for the time being as regards the district availing itself of the Government Valuation Board. The financial and auditor's report was read by the secretary and this showed a deficit balance of \$376.50. The auditor's report was adopted. Mr. A. E. Jenkins, who last year fulfilled the duties of auditor, was re-appointed to that position. The school inspector's report and the report of the public health nurse were read to the meeting by the secretary. These reports were adopted, with the understanding that the recommendations contained therein would be carried out by the School Board, as best they could, dependent on finances. The vote for teachers' supplement for the coming year was \$1550 and that for the school running expenses was \$1200. Mr. Emmerson Llewellyn, the out-going trustee was re-appointed to the School Board for a three year term. The minutes of the meeting were read to those assembled, as called for in the School Act, and the meeting then adjourned.

Island Born Prelate Celebrates Jubilee

Most Rev. A. A. Sinnott, D.D., D.C.L., of Winnipeg, was the guest of his diocesan clergy recently at ceremonies marking the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. In St. Mary's Cathedral, Winnipeg, solemn High Mass was celebrated by Msgr. Martin Kessler, Vicar General, assisted by the Archbishop's two nephews, Rev. John H. Mullally and Rev. Owen McInerney. The jubilee sermon was delivered by Msgr. James Reardon, St. Paul, Minn., a life-long friend of Archbishop Sinnott. Archbishop Sinnott and his clergy and visiting prelates had luncheon in the dining hall of Hudson Bay Company where congratulatory messages were tendered the jubilarian by hosts of friends. Present at his celebration were his sisters, Mrs. T. D. McInerney, Brandon, Man., Mrs. J. A. MacDonald, Calgary, Alberta, and Miss Hannie Sinnott, Brandon, Manitoba, and his brother, Edward Sinnott of Saskatoon, Sask. Two members of the American Hierarchy were present, also Most Rev. J. H. MacDonald, Archbishop of Edmonton, Most Rev. Michael O'Neill, Archbishop of Regina, Most Rev. F. P. Carroll of Calgary, and Most Rev. P. F. Poock, Bishop of Saskatoon.

His Eminence Cardinal McGuigan of Toronto was represented by Msgr. J. A. McDonagh, Toronto. Most Rev. James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown, was represented by Rev. Phelan McKenna, Morell, P.E.I., and Rev. A. L. Sinnott of Rollo Bay, P.E.I. Ordained at Rome

A native of Prince Edward Island, Alfred Arthur Sinnott was ordained in Rome by Archbishop Storor of Trebrond in 1900. In the following year in competition with students from all parts of the world Rev. Dr. Sinnott's name headed the list and he was awarded the degree of Doctor of Canon Law. On his return his first High Mass was offered up in the Church of St. Lawrence at Morell, P.E.I. In 1903 he was appointed private secretary to the Apostolic Delegate to Canada. Four years later he was honored by His Holiness Pius X when he was made private Chamberlain to the Holy Father and given the title of Monsignor. In 1915 he became one of the youngest Archbishops in the Roman Catholic Church. Three

Island Odds And Ends

Souris' idea of a fisherman's Regatta has gathered support from all over the Island. The men who risk their costly gear and quite often their lives, to bring us the delicacies of the sea, are entering the racing events in large numbers.

"Art" Paquet, chairman of the Souris Regatta Racing Committee, has entries from all points of the compass starting at Tignish and taking in East Point. Most experienced in a competitive sense are the crews and boats from Murray River, who have been winners for some years at the annual Picou races. It remains to be seen whether other Island boats can give them a run for the money, and there is no lack of challengers. On Regatta day, July 12th, there will be boats present from Tignish, Alberton, Morell, St. Peter's, Savage Harbor, North Lake, Gasperaux, Murray Harbor, Murray River, Rustico, Tracadie, Annadale, Lower Montserrat, and Head Neck. The regatta will be a fine affair with racing and other amusements; that much is assured by the long list of entries.

Racing is not the only item of the entertainment however. A strong committee composed of Jim Brennan, Brent St. John, Jack MacDonald and Bruce Stewart are looking after other departments of amusement which will be staged at Lighthouse Point. Lighthouse Point, by the way, overlooks the harbor and is an excellent natural grandstand from which to view the waterfront events.

It will be at Lighthouse Point also that the lobster banquet will be served, and the committee is determined that it will be a lobster feast to be remembered. There will be nothing niggardly about the meal, no skimpy helpings, say the committee in charge. A lobster banquet is being advertised and it will be as advertised—a banquet.

The town of Souris and the Souris Hospital will be the beneficiaries of the Regatta and will share any proceeds which result from the community effort. All the lobsters are being donated by fishermen and lobster packers, and all who serve in any way are giving their help and time gratis.

The people of Souris were disappointed when the Dominion of Parliament voted only \$50,000 for wharf and harbor improvements. They had hoped for something more far-reaching, totalling about \$200,000. The Eastern King's Board of Trade immediately re-acted and a protest in the form of a letter to the Minister of Public Works, Alphonse Fournier. He answered by telegram, addressed to Mr. Charles Boylan, secretary of Eastern King's Board of Trade. In substance, the minister promised that the repairs to Souris wharf and shed would be given careful consideration, in connection with plans now being discussed. It could be inferred from the telegram that the \$50,000 already voted is only a part of a larger scheme. The Board of Trade is waiting the outcome, prepared to make strong representations, if an increased grant falls short of expectations.

The canning of strawberries is becoming quite a seasonal industry in the Province. At Mt. Stewart, co-operative organizations will give employment to more than fifty people, while canning of the berries is underway.

The Montague Cold Storage Company has almost as many people lined up for work, and the Eastern Packing Company's strawberry canning crew may reach the hundred mark. Incidentally the Eastern Packing Company has orders from Newfoundland and the rest of the Maritimes for thousands of cases of berries. This sounds like very good business for the Island, representing a new and growing source of revenue. *

months after his consecration he was installed in the newly-created See of Winnipeg.

Archbishop Sinnott had fire and zeal and a courage which never wavered during the years, giving him a place in the hearts of his people and a position of honor among the distinguished prelates of the Dominion. His charge stretches over many hundreds of miles, the plains, the rocks and muskges. His apostolic zeal was not confined to particular peoples or sections. Summer after summer he commissioned groups of religious and lay readers to carry the tidings of the Christian faith to the isolated country places which seldom enjoyed the ministry of a priest.

His outstanding qualities of mind have been reflected in scholarly attainments. His ability as an orator placed him in the front rank of public speakers in Canada, and his writings show a rare command of language and clarity of expression. One of his successful undertakings was Camp Morton, known as one of the finest summer camps for children and adults in Canada.

Because of his interest in the Polish people of Canada he was made a patron of the Associated Poles of Canada and was awarded the Commander's Cross with star in the Order Polonia Aestivata.

He was fearless in his utterances and in 1938 condemned the Nazi regime following a boast by Field Marshal Goering that the German Air Force was itching to prove its invincibility.

"When man boasts, man is in his greatest peril," His Grace said. "Are we on the brink of catastrophe, the most appalling tragedy that man has ever known?"

True Success Story

A colorful figure in the British Columbia Legislature at Victoria is Thomas Uphill, M.L.A., a resident of Fernie, B.C., now in his seventy-fifth year.

Tom is a great booster for the laboring men and no wonder for he started life as a coal miner in his native Wales when he was only a youngster.

His dress, like his speeches, is tasteful, yet simple. For instance when a state dinner is given by the Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia, the Hon. Charles A. Banks, the brass hats turn out in "buttons and bows" — that is, all but Tom, who steps right into the picture in a natty business suit. Tom thinks it is disloyal to hard-working folk, to wear formal clothes even to Government House. "You can drink champagne and toast the King," he said on one occasion, "just as well in a working suit as in a monkey suit."

Tom Uphill will be seventy-six this June although he does not look older than sixty. He believes that keeping young is a matter of looking at life in just the right way and having loads of fun.

Uphill likes the flowing bowl and doesn't care a tinkers damn who knows it. He can still stay up half the night drinking rum and whiskey and telling tall tales while his cronies listen spell-bound. This has always been somewhat of a mystery to some younger M.L.A.'s who vow that after the night before they are a sorry looking lot, hating themselves for having been elected.

Even as a boy Uphill could stir people up and he has been doing just that ever since. Ten years after he came to Canada he ran for the Legislature. He was defeated. But he was elected in 1920 and has been elected seven times since.

The Uphills have five sons and one daughter, all grown up and on their own.

"Those who know him best say he does his duty by the people, though no one tells colorful Tom Uphill what to do.

This phenomenon in British Columbia's public life would like to see higher pensions, better roads, a higher standard of living for all Newfounders, all located on this North Shore drive.
