Dunn Thinks Canada Should Send All-Stars In Future

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy, (CP)—James Dunn, writer, president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, said Sunday Canada should consider sending "a truly representative national all-star team to future international competitions."

Dunn made the statement after watching Russia hand a 2-0 defeat to Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen, the 1955 Allan Cup champions, in the final game of the Olympic hockey tournament.

"Every country with a team in the tournament was represented by a national all-star team except Canada," said Dunn.

"We sent our best team over here and they played a wonderful game but we were beaten. I think we got to do something about it if we want to continue participating in these competitions."

Emphasizing that he was expressing a personal opinion and not speaking for the CAHA—governing body of hockey in Canada—Dunn suggested that the Allan Cup champions could be used as the nucleus of an all-star team.

PROPAGANDA WEAPON

"My idea would be to make four or five of the top players in the Allan Cup champions as the nucleus and then pack the team with the best players we could find around the country."

But Dunn emphasized that the CAHA could not be expected to finance such a team. It would have to be "a national effort."

Coach Bobby Bauer of Canada's third-place Olympic team said a hand-picked team would be the best propaganda weapon the Canadian government could devise.

Walker Cops Title For Second Time

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Doak Walker, who announced his retirement from professional football, won the National Football League's scoring championship last season, for the second time in his career.

Official league statistics show that Walker of the Detroit Lions scored 96 points, seven touchdowns, 27 conversions and 9 field goals. Vic Janowicz of Washington Redskins was second with 88 points, seven touchdowns and 10 field goals. George Blanda of Chicago Bears finished third with 81 points.

Protests Against Olympic Price Tag To Get Hearing

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (CP)—Protests by Canadian and American television networks against the price tag put on coverage of the 1956 summer Olympics at Melbourne, Australia have been given a hearing by Avery Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee.

Brundage Saturday told representatives of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, National Television and Radio System and Columbia Broadcasting System to get together in New York to prepare their case and recommendations and forward them to him in Chicago next month.

Australia is reported asking \$500,000 for the rights to TV coverage of the games. The networks have indicated they will refuse to cover the games rather than pay the prices asked. They have asked the right of free access for coverage by their own papers and radio correspondents.

Brundage told the TV representatives the International Olympic Committee is intent on giving fair treatment to all news media.

Experts Agree That Two Red Players Are Of NHL Calibre

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (CP)—Canadian hockey experts, who watched Russia's 2-0 victory over Canada's Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen in the final game of the Olympic hockey tournament Saturday, agreed that at least two of the Russian players are of National Hockey League calibre.

The Canadians were unanimous in picking husky defenceman Ivan Sologubov as the best NHL-type player on the Russian team.

Sologubov, 21 a standout against the Canadians, was appearing in his second world tournament.

One club in the American Hockey League—just one step below the NHL—already has made an offer to a Russian player.

Manager Jim Hendy of Cleveland Barons said at Cleveland Sunday he has called an offer of \$10,000 a season to goalie Nikolai Puchkov, who led Olympic netminders in the final tournament by yielding only five goals in as many games.

EXCELLENT PROSPECTS

Hendy said he has telegraphed the Central Registry of Organized Hockey at Montreal to put Puchkov on Cleveland's negotiation list.

Mil Dummler, sports editor of the Toronto Star, said Krylov, a left-winger, and Sologubov could become stars on any NHL club.

Olympic Flame Extinguished As Winter Games End

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy, (CP)—The Olympic flame was extinguished Sunday night, ending the 1956 winter games, 11 days of glory and disappointment for the athletes of 32 nations.

For Canada there was more disappointment than glory. For Russia it was just the opposite. Making its first appearance in the winter Olympics, the Soviet Union finished standing on top in the unofficial team standings and dethroned Canada's defending hockey champions.

For the second time in seven Olympics, Canadians failed to win a gold medal although they had been favored in the pairs figure skating. The speed skaters performed well, beating Canadian records for all distances, but finished well down the list in the four events.
