VARIETY OF ENTERTAINMENT FOUND IN 'COUNTY FAIR' - There is a wide variety of entertainment provided by Monogram's 'County Fair,' which opens today at the Capitol Theatre with Rory Calhoun, Jane Nigh and Florence Bates in the star roles. This Cinecolor film is a fine blend of romance, race track excitement, drama and comedy and well reflects the ability of director William Beaudine to handle players in each of those departments. The story moves at pleasant speed with most of the action taking place in the grounds of a county fair where Florence Bates operates a hamburger stand and her daughter, Jane Nigh, finds a double romance. The first object of her affections is Warren Douglas, a harness race driver. Rory Calhoun who, with his father, Emory Parnell, appears at the fair grounds as owners of harness race horses, gives Douglas some first-class competition in the romance field. Excitement stems from several racing sequences, and reaches a high pitch when a horse, once owned by Raymond Hatton but lost through an auction sale to Miss Bates, is entered in a race which presumably had been 'fixed.' The picture, a Jeffrey Bernard production produced by Walter Mirisch, finds its comedy frequently spurring from the always jovial Miss Bates and the dour faced Hatton. Rory Calhoun is excellent in his role of the wealthy young man. Miss Nigh turns in one of the first performances of her film career. Douglas does an outstanding piece of work as the one who competes with Calhoun for Miss Nigh's attention. The screenplay, authorized by W. Scott Darling, was photographed by Gilbert Warrenton. The music was written and directed by Ozzie Caswell.

Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald for King's County held court in the Court House at Georgetown on Friday, September 15th at 2.30 p.m. The first case was that of a female resident of High Bank, charged under the Highway Traffic Act, with having operated a motor vehicle, on the highway, without an operator's license. The party pleaded guilty and was fined \$5.00 and costs of \$4.50 or in default of payment to serve 10 days in King's County Jail in Georgetown. Two residents of Point Pleasant who had been arraigned on September 11th and charged under Section 164 (2-b) of the Excise Act, with having possession of two stills, appeared and had their case further adjourned to Montague at 6.30 p.m. on Monday, September 18th. A resident of Montague pleaded guilty to operating a truck on the highway at a speed in excess of 30 miles per hour, under Section 306 (2A) of the Highway Traffic Act. He was fined \$10.00 and costs of \$2.50 or in default of payment to serve 10 days in King's County Jail. Court adjourned to 6.30 p.m. on Sept. 18th at Montague.
