

Flying Curlers Prepare For European Venture

Curlers and curling enthusiasts from Windsor, Bridgetown, La Havre, Wolfville, Sydney, Halifax, St. Stephen, St. John, Woodstock, Campbellton, Moncton, Charlottetown, Summerside, and Montague will start congregating at Moncton Tuesday evening where on Wednesday afternoon, January 16th, at 2 p.m. they will board a Maritime Central Airways DC4 plane destined for Prestwick Scotland.

As the plane leaves Moncton airport, 73 Flying Curlers will be on their way on the tour that will take them first to Scotland and then as far as St. Moritz, Switzerland.

After a brief stop at Gander, Nfld., the plane will set down the next morning at Prestwick, where they will be met by curlers from Glasgow. At Glasgow the Maritime curlers will be entertained until Saturday, January 19th, with evening, cocktail parties, receptions, banquets and sightseeing.

The Lord Provost of Glasgow will preside at one of the banquets and at another the curlers will be entertained by the Royal Caledonian Curling Club of Scotland.

On Saturday the curlers move on to Edinburgh where another full program has been planned including a cocktail party tendered by Mr. R.H. Thomson of the Thomson Publishing Co.

Pineau Fires Four Goals To Pace 6-5 B.Y.C. Win

Merrill Pineau's fourth goal of the night at 6:12 of a 10-minute overtime period gave the B.Y.C. a 6-5 victory over St. Dunstan's University in an Island Hockey League game at the Sports Arena last night.

Less than three minutes later the Saints were back with Joe Mahar setting up Lemay who picked the short side to beat Doyle cleanly. That was all the scoring during the period, although both squads missed some good chances.

IN LEAD TWICE

The Saints took the lead twice in the second period but couldn't hold it. Whelan put them in front with his first goal only 17 seconds after the period commenced on a passing play with Jack and Ed MacDonald. Pineau tied it up at 2:12 when Howatt sent him sailing into the clear with a pass near Saints' defense. Whelan batted in Jack MacDonald's passout at 5:43 for a 3-2 lead for the Saints but the youth club came back with two in a row to take a 4-3 lead at the end of the second. Pineau deflected Howatt's knee-high shot behind Shepherd for the tying goal and Frank Shepherd put them in front in the last minute whizzing a low shot from the blue-line after taking Whitlock's pass.

The youth club seemed to have things sewed up when Howatt's high shot was deflected behind Shepherd for 5-3 lead but the Saints came fighting back with two goals to send the game into overtime. Whelan shot his third at 14:59 and three minutes later Ray Hache let loose with a low screened shot from the blueline that caught the corner of the net.

Both goaltenders Thane Doyle of B.Y.C. and Earl Shepherd of Saints had to come through with some fine puckstopping. Shepherd kicked out 36 of the 42 drives sent his way and Doyle turned aside 33 of 38 drives.

PRES. CAMPBELL FANS' TARGET

Wild Scenes As Canucks Nip Toronto Leafs 2-1

MONTREAL (CP)—Scores of fans incensed at the work of referee Frank Udvari turned their demonstration against President Clarence Campbell of the National Hockey League Thursday night immediately after Montreal Canadiens had snatched a 2-1 decision from Toronto Maple Leafs on Don Marshall's goal with six seconds left in play.

Maurice (Rocky) Richard, whose suspension by Campbell in March, 1955, provoked a riot in the Montreal Forum, was a minor figure in the wild demonstration that ended Thursday night's game.

Three times earlier in the game the crowd of 15,776 had vented displeasure at Udvari by boisterous cheering and stamping programs to the ice. Each time the game was held up.

The third demonstration came at 18:14 of the third period, when Richard was penalized for high-sticking as the Leafs stormed in trying for the goal that would put them in a 1-1 tie.

Dick Duff supplied the goal at 18:37. The Rocket returned to the ice and began arguing vehemently with referee Udvari. Defenceman Doug Harvey and other teammates quickly policed the Rocket, who showed signs of a temperamental explosion.

Finally the enraged Richard slammed his stick to the ice in disgust, breaking it cleanly. Referee Udvari promptly handed out a 10-minute misconduct and the fans' demonstration broke loose all over again.

Once more the game got going and when Marshall electrified the crowd into a new demonstration—this time in jubilation—there was a fresh shower of programs leaving and stamping programs to the ice. Each time the game was held up.

A few programs were aimed at the president. When the game ended the vocal demonstration increased as policemen and ushers stood guard around the box.

Campbell sat quietly while the

crowd roared. Comparatively few programs were aimed at him. None appeared to hit him or his wife. Slowly police and ushers got the crowd thinned so Campbell could leave, with escort in front and back of him and his wife. It was fully 10 minutes after the game ended when he left.

Curlers From Canada, U. S. To Compete In Week Bonspiel

QUEBEC (CP) — More than 800 curlers from Canada and the United States will compete in the week-long Quebec international bonspiel starting Feb. 2.

"We now have entries from 128 rinks," H. E. Weyman, bonspiel organizer said Thursday, "and we expect several more."

The entry list includes 32 Ontario rinks, 12 from Nova Brunswick, nine from New Scotia, 29 from Quebec province outside the Quebec city area, 16 from the United States and at least one each from Manitoba and Saskatchewan.

Teams from Boston New York Detroit Chicago and Milwaukee will be among the American representatives.

The clubs will compete for 15 trophies in the knock-out tournament. Main awards are the Lieutenant-Governor's Cup and the Seagrams grand aggregate and the Omega trophies. As teams are defeated they drop from competition for the major silverware and compete for less important awards.

A.F. Muth who skipped his Quebec Victoria quartet to top honors last year, will be trying for an unprecedented repeat. Major opposition is expected from the Campbell Brothers Rink from Avonlea, Sask.—winners of the 1955 MacDonalds Brier.

The 12 top soldiers registering the best times and distances in the minor and major meets will compete in the Army championship which is to be held in the second week of August. Following this meet an Army team will be selected to compete in national and international meets.

Events to be contested for are: 110 yard dash; 220 yard dash; 440 yard dash; 880 yards; mile run; 3-mile run; 6-mile run; 120 yards high hurdles; 440 yards low hurdles; pole vault; high jump; broad jump; hop, step and jump; 16-pound shot putt; javelin; discus; hammer throw; 440 yards relay.

GRINDELWALD, Switzerland (AP)—Carla Marchelli of Italy won the slalom race of the Swiss International Women's Ski championships Thursday, beating top Austrian women skiers for the second day in succession.

Her two victories over most of Europe's top-ranking skiers made Miss Marchelli, 21, a top contender for next year's world championships in Austria.

She completed her two slalom runs in 52.0 and 50.3 seconds, for a total of 102.3.

She beat the top Austrians Wednesday by more than two seconds, but her victory Thursday was due to the disqualification of Austria's veteran racer Trude Klecker.
