Her selection, which was highly dramatic and powerful, held the undivided attention of the large and varied audience from the beginning to the end. She certainly possesses talents as a reader of a very high order, and well deserved the applause which was so generously accorded her. ### Local and Other Items.

THE WEATHER.—Moderate to fresh westerly wind, fair and cold.

THE STAGE.—Zera Semon and his boy Lawrence are playing to big houses in St. John's, Nfld.

THE STANLEY crossed to Georgetown this forenoon, and the passengers came to the city by special train arriving about 2.10. The steamer will leave for Pictou on Monday morning.

MAY COME THIS WAY.—It is said that Mr. William Richards, who has been here with the Ebel Tucker Company, has made arrangements to start two famous actresses throughout Canada.

AT THE CAPES.—The boats took 107 bags of mail matter from Cape Tormentine to-day, leaving at 8.40. Seventy-two bags of papers were left behind. The mail special reached the city at 2.15.

THE TEMPERATURE.—The lowest reading last night was 5 below zero. There was no change at 9 o'clock this morning. During the night the wind blew at the rate of between 25 and 39 miles an hour.

FIGHTING TUBERCULOSIS.—The need of fighting tuberculosis is becoming more widely recognized now every day. The Board of Health of Brantford, Ont., have put to a tuberculin test all cows supplying milk to the town. Six cows were destroyed as a result of the first inspection. The health officer of Downey township is disinfecting houses where tuberculous patients have died.

THE SUMMERSIDE DEFICIT.—The Summerside town accounts are being investigated with a view to ascertaining the exact amount of the shortage. The Town Clerk, it is reported, crossed at the capes yesterday. He has two securities in \$100. It is thought that the town's interests have been so secured that little if any loss will be sustained by the corporation.

STILL ON THE SEARCH.—The search for Andree still goes on. The expedition being organized by Captain Daniel Brunn this summer will start from Copenhagen and go to Janmay, a small volcanic island 300 miles east of Greenland, where a depot was left by the Austrians. This will be searched. Thence the expedition will proceed to Cape Bismarok and Cape Barclay to the east coast of Greenland.

GOOD FOR HAZELBROOK.—The Hazelbrook Dairy Company at their annual meeting passed a resolution, favorable to the appointing of an inspector for the Island and expressed their willingness to bear a proportionate share of the salary of said inspector. The Secretary made a statement of work done for November and December showing that an average price of 72c was being paid the patrons and their milk delivered at their factory free.

FUNERAL TO-DAY.—The funeral of the late Archibald Bunn, an old and esteemed resident of Charlottetown, took place this morning, and there was a good attendance of mourning citizens notwithstanding the cold weather. The interment was at the Roman Catholic cemetery. The services at the cathedral and at the grave were taken by Father Johnston. The pall-bearers were D. Nicholson, James Eden, Henry Smith, H. C. Douse, W. B. Robertson and William Murray.

WELL DONE CAPT. TAYLOR.—Mr. James Foote, of Queen Street, has lately received a letter from his nephew, Capt. Orestes Taylor, who, notwithstanding his heavy loss of last year at Halifax, where his vessel was wrecked, is again on his feet and has purchased the fine schooner B. C. Borden, 415 tons register. This vessel will carry a cargo equal to 750 tons dead weight, cost \$11,000, and is only four years old. The B. C. Borden sails shortly from St. John, N. B., for the Canary Islands with a load of lumber. We have in Capt. Taylor another illustration of the ability of our Newfoundland men to surmount obstacles and push ahead in the world, and we cordially congratulate him at the same time wishing him continued and increased prosperity.—St. John's, Nfld, News.
