A BATHING HOUSE FOR MONCTON.—A number of mechanics in the Moncton Railway works have been talking of a public bathing house for Moncton.

EXTRAORDINARY precautions were taken to protect the Marquis of Lorne when on his visit to the Maritime Provinces, on account of a report that his life would be in danger.

GOVT CHAMBER, late A. D. C. to the Governor General, will immediately after the Northwest trip proceed to England, and will be promoted to the rank of Major.

THE TEA PARTY at Alberton to-day was largely attended, and no doubt a very pleasant time was spent. The trains which left here this morning landed over thirteen hundred passengers on the grounds.

EXCURSIONISTS to Pugwash to-morrow can leave either by morning or afternoon trip. If they prefer going at half-past three a. m., a pleasant time can be spent around Pugwash, Wallace, and adjacent places. A grand time is expected.

MRS. LANGTRY, the London professional beauty, has written to a friend in that city that she will visit America next October, and it is said that apartments have already been secured for her at the Westminster, New York.

A FRIGHTFUL ACCIDENT occurred at Sussex, N. B., on the 14th inst., by which a son of Mr. Francis Buchanan, at Upper Corners, aged 14, will lose a leg and a part of his hand. The boy in some way got possession of an unexploded bombshell which had been left by the militia, and was playing with it in his father's shop, when it exploded, shattering the leg and hand frightfully.

THE new woollen factory at Charlottetown has begun to place its tweeds and other descriptions of manufactured goods in the market. They are said to be superior in many respects to those imported. With several such mills in operation, all manufacturing fine tweeds, and with increased capacity since the introduction of the N. P., there is now no reason why the Islanders should be dependent on the other Provinces or foreign manufacturers for goods of this class.—Moncton Times.

ARRANGEMENTS have been made for the issue of return tickets at single fares at Summerside and Miscouche on the 26th, good for return on 28th, and at Charlottetown, Souris, and intermediate Stations, on 27th, good for return on 28th, to parties desirous of attending the Tea Party at East Point on the 27th inst. As the tea grounds are situated some distance from Harmony Station, a pleasant drive along the North Side, as well as an enjoyable day at the sea side, will be afforded those attending.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND FRENCH PEOPLE FOR MEMRAMOOC.—The boat from Summerside to Point du Chene yesterday brought a large number of the French people of Prince Edward Island, who intended taking part in the demonstration at Memramooc to-day. The boat was crowded with the visitors, who thoroughly enjoyed themselves on board and are evidently a very respectable body of people. A special train left here and conveyed the excursionists from the Point direct to Memramooc, where they all arrived safely and were met by their entertainers. The special afterwards proceeded back to Moncton.—Moncton Times.

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.—About nine o'clock on Saturday morning, Mr. George Glew, with his team, consisting of a pair of horses and a hay rack, loaded with about five hundred feet of boards and some shingles, Mr. James Forbes, the owner of the lumber, and two boys, aged about ten years each, were crossing a bridge at the upper end of the mill and tannery, when the entire western span fell through to the bed of the stream. Mr. Forbes was badly bruised; the smallest boy, named Simmon, succeeded in reaching the shore; the largest boy, named Elbridge Calligan, got upon a plank and was making for the shore when a falling timber struck him and he was knocked off, going down among the debris, and was drowned. A man took a birch and followed down near the falls (which have a fall of forty feet), and succeeded in getting the body before it reached the rapids. His remains were taken to his relatives, who live near the State Fish Aquarium. The horses were saved. The lumber was lost and the wagon wrecked.—Bangor Whig.

Sir Hector Langovin completed his tour in the Maritime Provinces on Saturday. During the sixteen days spent there he received twenty-one addresses, inspected twenty-seven different public works, delivered thirty speeches in English and French, and attended seventeen meetings, not including receptions and various minor engagements, an amount of work which shows the Minister of Public Works to be among the busiest of Ministers. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, July 19. When the Land Bill gets through the committee there will remain clauses 12, 15, 27 and 34 for consideration. There are three and a half pages of amendments to these new clauses which, with amendments, cover 21 printed pages.

The "News" announces that Law has declined to serve on the Land Commission, owing to the lack of physical strength. Sergeant O'Hagan is well known in Ireland as a writer of verse, chiefly political. Vernon gave evidence before the Richmond and Beesborough commissions where his evidence was so fair and friendly to tenants that his appointment is the one most approved by the Home Rulers. Lytton's appointment will cause a vacancy in Parliament for Tyrone.

This however, need not occur until the Land Bill becomes law. Dickson of Dunganon will probably be the Liberal and Marquis of Hamilton the Conservative candidate for the vacancy.

The meeting convened on Monday night by the Revolutionary Congress now being held in London, was crowded with an enthusiastic audience of both sexes. The first resolution, declaring that the time for agitation by means of press and platform had ceased, the time has now come for force, was moved by Citizen Lecourt, delegate from the United States. Louise Michel, of Paris, seconded the resolution, which was supported by a large number of delegates from various countries, and was carried unanimously.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 19. It is stated at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs that the person found in the cemetery on Friday was not a policeman as reported, but a Nihilist who, like Ruskoff, had been chosen by lot to assassinate the Czar, and who, rather than obey, suicided.

PARIS, July 19. The announcement that serious engagements have taken place near Sfax, on Saturday, is confirmed. Most of the leaders of the revolt were killed. The result has produced a great impression on the Arabs. The French command at Sfax has ordered the immediate disarmament of the natives, the delivery of hostages, and payment of war indemnity of 15,000,000 francs.
