Death In City Hospital Of Geo'town Man

The death occurred in the Charlottetown Hospital on Wednesday, April 6, of Frank J. Soloman, highly respected and well known citizen of Georgetown. The deceased who was 78 years old, passed away, following an illness of a month's duration. He was a resident of Georgetown for the past 57 years, during which time, except for the past few years of retirement, he carried on a barbering business. He was well known and highly regarded throughout the whole province.

Mr. Soloman possessed to a high degree a marked sense of civic duty and served on various Town Councils and as a member of the Board of School Trustees. He was a past president of the Georgetown Community Welfare League. Always keenly interested in sport, he, in his capacity, as president of the Community Welfare League, realized the necessity of a modern recreational centre for Georgetown and was one of the most ardent workers in its planning and erection. He continued, up to the time of his illness, to interest himself in the management of this centre.

Mr. Soloman was one of the first residents of Georgetown, and in fact on the island, to own an automobile. He visited, and was well known in practically every island community.

In his death, Georgetown has suffered the loss of one of her most respected citizens who was ever ready to give of his time and

energy to promote projects beneficial to the Town. He was married to the former Ada Batchelder of Georgetown. She predeceased him in October, 1950. A daughter, Ann, passed away in 1922.

Surviving members of the family are, four daughters: Ann (Mrs. Romie Ceredini), Agnes (Mrs. P. J. Henry), Freida (Mrs. Gerald Morrison) all of Georgetown and Estelle (Mrs. C. P. Bolger), Summerside, also a son Walter of Georgetown. A surviving brother, P. J. Soloman, is a well known merchant of Georgetown.

The deceased was a member of St. James R. C. Church. At the time of writing funeral arrangements had not been finalized.

Eden Becomes

Eden paid tribute to his former chief and added: "I for my part will do all I can to serve our country."

The debonair diplomat gave no hint of when he will order elections nor of when he will announce his government. It is not expected to differ much from Churchill's.

The House of Commons was packed for his minister's debut. MPs, unable to find seats, equated in the aisles. Ambassadors crowded the diplomatic gallery to see the new prime minister settle comfortably into the spot on the green-upholstered bench which for years had borne Churchill's ample figure.

From a balcony Lady Eden, in a light fawn coat and a green skull cap, gazed calmly down, Clarissa Eden, niece of Churchill, is the new prime minister's second wife. He divorced his first.

YOUNG MAN FOR OLD JOB. — Edens was summoned to Buckingham Palace shortly before 11 a. m. In a formal audience the Queen invited him to head the government. He kissed her hand according to ancient tradition and accepted.

He thus became the youngest British prime minister for the last 30 years—since Stanley Baldwin at 56 formed his first administration.

The office of prime minister in its present form began with Sir Robert Walpole in 1721. Previously monarchs had presided over cabinet meetings but King George I was unwilling to attend them because as a German he did not understand English.

The Edens will move into Downing street after Easter.

Eden Wednesday night worked on the composition of his new government. All the ministers who were in office at the change-over are continuing at their desks, but they have placed their portfolios at the disposal of the new premier.

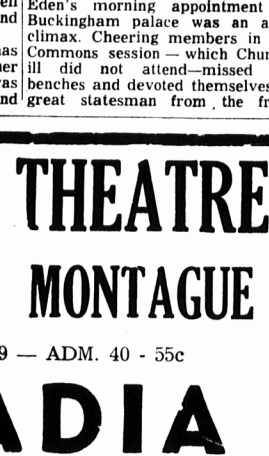

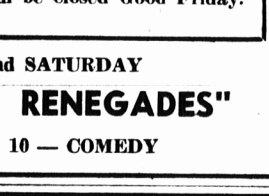
