SUMMERSIDE — The new liquor store on Granville Street North here opened for business yesterday with little fanfare. The doors opened at 10 o'clock sharp and the first purchaser was Eric Johnston of Capital Enterprises, the firm which erected the modern, spacious building.
 The quiet opening was an anti-climax to a turbulent three months which has seen Athena Regional High School ratepayers hold protest meetings and marches in an effort to have the liquor outlet erected elsewhere.
 The building gradually took shape over the past three months, despite all the activity of the ratepayers who claim the store is too near the regional high school, situated a short distance south, and will create a bad impression for the students.

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Aid If Conservatives Elected, Inshore Fishermen Promised

"We are determined to create in the fishing industry a workable system which will guarantee a minimum annual financial return to the inshore fisherman," Mr. MacLean said last night.
 The former fisheries minister and his Conservative teammate were addressing a meeting in the fishing centre of North Rustico. "The inshore fisherman must be assured a fair return for his labor and efforts," Mr. MacLean stressed. "A Conservative government will put forth a program developed on a principle which will insure against catch failure", he stated.
 "We are also determined to institute more effective methods to make more readily available to inshore fishermen adequate financial loans which shall be which will allow the fishermen to improve his fishing boats and gear and so have a better opportunity to obtain better catches, and we will press forward programs with provincial fisheries departments designed to improve fishing gear and techniques," he concluded.

New Democrats Name Candidate

ALBERTON — At a nominating convention in Bloomfield last night a Tignish fisherman, Harvey Dawson, 48, was nominated as the Prince County New Democratic candidate in the forthcoming election.
 The nomination was moved by William Handrahan, Tignish and seconded by Melvin Hackett, Tignish.
 The name of Douglas MacFarlane, Bedouque, was also proposed resulting in a ballot vote in favor of Mr. Dawson. Mr. MacFarlane's nomination was moved by John P. Wallace, Elmsdale and seconded by T.W. Mullin.
 In brief addresses prior to the vote, Mr. MacFarlane told the 12 people in attendance that he could not find time to campaign while Mr. Dawson, who is single, said he was willing and able to put on a vigorous campaign from North Cape to Borden. Cliff Ashfield, Maritime organizer for the NDP told the convention that their party is heading for a full slate and have 260 candidates at present. They will have a full slate in Nova Scotia and already have one in New Brunswick.
 Mr. Ashfield predicted that the Liberal and Conservative parties would form a coalition in the near future and that this would result in the decline of the Tory party.

Fur Association Has Annual Meet

SUMMERSIDE — The P.E.I. Fur Breeders held a field day and educational program here yesterday with fur breeders from all over the Island attending.
 Foreman Richard Steel guided the visitors through the Dominion experimental fur farm on Central Street and a demonstration of grading and selection of foxes by George Calbeck followed.
 The breeders met at the ranch of Lowell W. Hancock of Summerside, national president of the Canada Mink Breeders Association, and watched a pelting, skinning, fleshing, tanning and setting of pelts.
 In the evening those attending the field day enjoyed a dinner banquet, courtesy of the P.E.I. Fur Breeders Association, at a downtown restaurant.
 Following to dinner there were remarks by Clayton Mill, president of the association, a report on current market trends of fox and mink by Lloyd Lockery of their Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders Association, and a report on the annual meeting of the Canada Mink

Breeders' Association in Calgary by Mr. Hancock.

In his report on the annual convention held in Calgary in September, Mr. Hancock said that the decision had been made there to set up a system of fur dealers authorized by the Canada Mink Breeders Association and this would do much to raise standards of fur retailing all over the country. He mentioned that the organization's budget this year was a record \$360,000 and that \$237,000 of this would be spent on promotion and advertising.
 Speaking generally of mink breeding, Mr. Hancock said, "quality should be our watchword. Mink will be in demand as long as there are women. But our problem is to keep quality high."
 Special mention was made of the live fox and live mink show which will be held in Charlottetown Nov. 9 through to the 12th, under the auspices of the P.E.I. Fur Breeders Association. It is expected that there will be exhibitors from both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, as well as P.E.I.
 New secretary of the association is Claude A. Paynter, 20 Hillside Drive, Charlottetown, and all entries and inquiries about the show should be addressed to Mr. Paynter.
 The meeting was concluded by a showing of color slides on mink ranching by Mr. Hancock.
