AN INCORPORATED RIOT QUELLED.—The 3rd inst. was the last day of the military camp at Toronto, and the different corps left for home. A serious riot was narrowly averted. Some persons cut down the tents of the 77th battalion while the inmates were asleep, and the latter believing the members of the 12th battalion, bet on whom and the 77th there had been a long standing grudge, to be the guilty parties, a general fight was proposed and the battle sounded the assembly. Word was despatched to the main guard, which came to the scene of action on the double quick. The 77th were ordered to their tents, but refused to obey, saying they wanted to "kick" the 12th. The guard they wanted to fix bayonets, and the 77th then ordered to disperse, word refusing a second time to disperse, word given to charge, and several of the 77th received bayonet wounds before the order was obeyed.

Work of the Fire Fiend.

Immense Loss of Property.

TORONTO, July 6.  
The dye house of the winery factory at Brantford was burned on Saturday, the loss is \$1,000.  
On Saturday a heavy rain put out the Ontario brush fires, but not until the enormous loss was sustained.  
The Port Perry fire on Saturday left no business houses standing in the village. Not even a paper of pins can be purchased in the village. The heart of the place is a smouldering ruin, and not a wall is standing in the district. The loss is a quarter of a million dollars.  
Three hundred persons have been rendered homeless by the destruction of the greater part of Lachine village by fire. The scene of the fire beggars description. A number of chimneys standing up bare and solitary tell the dismal tale. Thirty-five houses were burned and seventy families of the poorer class made homeless. The loss is estimated at \$50,000. Assistance to suppress the fire was sent from Montreal or the whole village would have been swept away.

Cholera Spreading.

MARSAILLES, July 6.  
The intense heat aggravated cholera. An outbreak of small-pox has occurred at Vigan in the department of Gard. Seventeen deaths occurred. It has been proved that the ship Sartre introduced cholera into France. She had fourteen cases on board while in the Red Sea. Twelve deaths from cholera have occurred here for the 24 hours ending Saturday evening.  
TOULON, July 6.  
Four deaths from cholera to-day. There are 130 cases in the hospitals.

A Destructive Storm.

ST. LOUIS, July 5.  
A great storm is raging throughout Southern and Central Illinois on Friday night, doing damage to property of all kinds. In Mason county it wrecked thirty farm houses and ruined thousands of acres of grain crops. Telegraph wires went down cutting off communication. It is estimated that damage to the amount of \$200,000 has been done in Macon County. Two children of John Kraft, living near Decatur, were fatally injured in the wreck of their house.

Going to Shell Arabs.

LONDON, July 6.  
Advices from Suakin report that the British gunboat Concor has gone to Agig, to shell the Arabs who are stealing off the supplies of friendly Arabs.

A Great Battle—Heavy Loss of Life.

CAIRO, July 5.  
The Governor of Ingo now telegraphs from Debbeh that he has fought a great battle with the rebels and killed four thousand, himself losing two thousand men. The news is not believed. Later on the same day the Governor telegraphed for arms and ammunition.

A Steamboat Accident.

PATCH, N. Y., July 6.  
Yesterday afternoon, during a fog, the steamship Gulf of St. Vincent, from Cullcutta for New York, ran ashore on south beach, half-a-mile east of Hone Hill life-saving station. Her crew of 33 and 7 passengers were taken ashore. The vessel is badly bilged.

Beware of Refreshing Ice Cream.

NEW YORK, July 6.  
Over a hundred people including men, women and children, living in the vicinity of Carleton Avenue and Fulton Street Brooklyn, were taken violently ill yesterday after eating ice cream. All of which from the same dealer. As yet none of the sufferers have died, but several are very low. The symptoms are those of copper poisoning.
