Injured In Diving At Victoria Park

Thomas Lund, age 17, son of John Lund, 37 Spring Park Road received a nasty laceration of the scalp when he dove off the top of a Park bathing house at six o'clock last evening. There was not more than 5 feet of water at the breastwork at the time, and according to Police Sgt. Gus Dowling who witnessed the accident, the injured boy struck bottom head-on.

He was able to leave the water and run over to the patrol wagon and was rushed to the Charlotte town Hospital where an examination by Dr. C. A. Coady, followed by the necessary attention enabled him to proceed to his home.

Police expressed the opinion that a spring board or raft at each of the bathing houses would eliminate the dangerous practice of diving and jumping from the top of the bathing houses.

Studying Action Of Tides, Currents At North Rustico

Under instructions from the Dominion Department of Public Works, Ottawa, Dr. S. J. Mezur and Prof. V. E. Vaughan, are making a study of tidal and current action at North Rustico, with frequent soundings to determine the variations under changing conditions as they developed. The survey study was started on June 11 and is expected to continue until September 1.

Dr. Mezur, who is on the science service staff of the Nova Scotia Technical College, is presently in Halifax in connection with the work, while Prof. Vaughan, Associate Professor of the Institute of Civil Engineering, continues to carry on alone, for the time being. The work entails a 24 hour watch at this particular time and soundings at various points particularly in the run in the vicinity of Robinsons Island, a local motor boat, owned and operated by Mr. Peter Terlizick, is in constant attendance.

Major V. N. Hodson, executive secretary of the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League has been engaged by the Federation to act as campaign manager, a move which will be of great assistance in keeping down the overhead expenses of the P. E. I. group.

forestation. The Department of Industry and Natural Resources, through its forestry division headed by Mr. Frank Gaudet, hopes to plant a total of 40 acres of trees each year from now on. They will be put in on vacant farms where a soil survey has indicated that the land is not suitable for agriculture.

Other recent experiments of the Division will result, it is hoped, in interesting private woodlot owners in the growing of balsam fir (Var) trees for Christmas trees. When developed, these trees would provide owners with a steady annual income as the majority of people prefer this type tree at the festive season because it does not drop to the same extent as ordinary spruce. At the same time the Division is planning on introducing a better quality spruce next year.

A further innovation in this Province is the introduction of the European larch which is reported to be an excellent source of wood for fence posts. In this connection it is said to be as good as cedar and is an exceptionally fast growing tree.

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VISITING PROVINCE — Shyam Kaul, B.Sc., B.E., of Lucknow, India is enjoying a few days' vacation in the Province. Mr. Kaul was born at Jhansi, United Province, India, and graduated from Benaras University with his Bachelor of Science Degree, later taking his Bachelor's degree in engineering from Roorkee University, India's greatest technical institution. He was selected last year under the Colombo plan, by the Canadian Government as one of the students Canada would accept, and was assigned to the Nova Scotia Technical College, Halifax. Mr. Kaul expects to obtain his Master's Degree in Engineering from that institution next November.

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Bishop Announces Building Fund Campaign For Hospital

Organization is now underway of the Bishop's Hospital Building Fund which seeks to raise at least \$300,000 to help defray the cost of the building program at the Charlottetown Hospital, it is announced by the Most Reverend James Boyle, D.D., Bishop of Charlottetown. Funds are needed to pay for the construction cost of the hospital's new pavilion, which was opened in 1950 and for the complete renovation and modernization of the original hospital structure.

While the greater part of the hospital's building program has been completed, construction is still in progress on the new Pediatrics Department and on various other hospital facilities. According to Sister Mary of Good Counsel, Hospital Administrator, the new Pediatrics Department as well as all other renovation and improvements will be completed within the month. The completed hospital will be second to none in the area and will include many medical services and facilities unique to the province.

The overall cost of the nearly-completed hospital expansion program represents a sum in the \$1,000,000 bracket. The present appeal seeks to raise the \$300,000 needed to liquidate the bank loan it was necessary to make to finish paying for the building costs. The

remaining cost of construction is represented by a bond issue to be paid off during the next 15 years.

Pressing Requirements
The present financial situation at the hospital is such that it cannot pay off the existing construction debt and at the same time provide effective medical service at a figure much less than the Dominion average and continue its free care and charity which in 1951 alone amounted to more than \$60,000.

The preliminary phases of the campaign organization are now being carried out from campaign headquarters which have been established in the Knights of Columbus Building at 21 Water Street. Diocesan records list the names of nearly 10,000 adult contributing Catholics, each of whom will be called upon personally and asked to subscribe his or her just share of the Fund's \$300,000 objective in accordance with his or her ability to pay.

Each of the 53 parishes and missions in the Diocese of Charlottetown are organizing themselves for active participation in the hospital fund-raising program. Chairmen have been enlisted in all parishes and missions and will supervise the organization of separate parochial building fund volunteer solicitation committees. Enlistment of

volunteer solicitors will be carried out on a pyramid basis and, aside from the parish chairmen, will include vice-chairmen, team captains and team workers.

Parish Organization
In the larger parishes, the parish chairmen will enlist one vice-chairman for every 100 families, or nearest 100 families. Each of these vice-chairmen then will enlist five male fellow-parishioners to serve on the committee as team members. Thus, each individual parish committee requirement will call for the enlistment of approximately one fourth to one third of all male parishioners. Every member of the fifty-odd individual committees will be asked to call personally upon three or four of his fellow parishioners and discuss with them their financial participation in the Bishop's Hospital Building Fund.
