News Notes.

A Russian official paper says the true object of the triple alliance is war.

In China the inhabitants are counted every year in a curious manner. The oldest master of every ten houses has to count the families, and has to make a list, which is sent to the Imperial tax house. Last year the whole number amounted to 873,383,500 inhabitants.

A young man in Liverpool stole £100, part of which he spent in buying a watch and chain and a diamond ring. On account of his "respectable appearance" he was released on bail. As the respectable appearance was largely due to a judicious investment of the £100, the case is not wholly unlike that of a man who killed both his parents and then asked to be treated leniently because he was "a poor orphan."

The well-known detection of crime, in "Diplomacy," through the perfume of a woman's glove, was reproduced, says a foreign paper, by a recent occurrence in Paris. A man who found his room robbed of all his jewelry perceived a peculiar perfume, and a few days later noticed it again when passing two well-dressed women in the street. They were arrested and found to be the thieves.

Experiments have recently been made at Kiel by the German naval authorities on torpedoes made of paper and worked by electricity. The results are said to have been very satisfactory. The torpedo is about 11 feet long by 16 inches in diameter, and is made of 12 layers of paper 14 inches thick, compressed and varnished. The motor is mounted on three paper ribs and driven from the ship or shore by a cable, the steering and ignition of the charge being controlled through the same cable.

Every alternate Friday, steamer will go to Saturday, at 3 o'clock, a. m., will leave Charlottetown for Crapaud; leaving Charlottetown at 3 a. m.; returning to Charlottetown same evening.
