The Revenue of P. E. Island for 1867.

Below will be found a statement of the Revenue for the financial year ending 31st January 1868, and a comparison of the sources from which it has been derived for the last and previous years:

Duties, Land Assessment, Public Lands, Crown Lands, Rent of Warren Farm, Post Office, Col. Secretary's Fees, Registrar's Fees, Excise Fees, Warehouse Fees, Land Assessment Fees, Prince Wales College, License Duties, Salt, Fines and Penalties, Casual and Bonds, Wharfage, Mill Barrack Ground, Rent of Oyster Beds, Miscellaneous.

From the foregoing figures, it will be seen that there is this year an increase in the amount of revenue received from Georgetown, Grand River, Rustico, Crapaud, Malpeque, and Orwell Bay, while there is a considerable falling off at all the other ports.

The receipts from Public Lands are £2,941 12s. 11d. less than they were in 1866, but considering that the first (and largest) instalments of the Cunard Purchase were paid that year, the reduction is not so heavy as we anticipated.

The Military Barrack ground also yields a smaller revenue than it did in 1866, which will be the case every year until the purchase money is all paid into the Government.

In the "Miscellaneous" item is included the sum of £864 15s. received from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick as contributions towards the erection of the North Cape and East Point Light Houses.

The heavy importations of 1866 have, as was foreseen, materially affected the trade of 1867, but all things considered, we think the revenue of the present, though over £17,000 short of that of last year, is a good one. It exceeds the expenditure by nearly £4,000.—Patriot Feb 6.
