

Local and Other Items.

The City Council meets this evening at 7.30. NORTH RIVER OYSTERS at the Union House, (May 15 31 pd)

The "Northern Light" will arrive in Charlottetown to-night.

The "Princess of Wales" left Pictou for this port at 2.15 p. m.

The steamer "St. Lawrence" left Summerside for Shediac at noon to-day.

ONE case of assault and a case of drunkenness at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon.

It is reported that Mr. Gladstone will shortly resign the Chancellorship of the Exchequer.

A boy named Thomas Reast was, on Friday last, crushed to death between two flat cars at the Halifax Deep Water Terminal.

REPORTS from Port Hawkesbury state that the Straits of Canso are blocked with ice, and the shipping will be detained for a few days to come.

The Liberal-Conservatives will meet in Walsh & Owen's building, Queen Street, at eight o'clock, to organize for the coming Dominion election.

The Charlottetown Land League meets this evening at 8 o'clock, in St. Patrick's Hall, when the half-yearly election of officers will take place.

The "Orphan Boy" will be shown at the Market to-morrow; and will stand at Connelly's Livery Stable during the remaining portion of the day.

A SPECIAL TRAIN will hereafter leave this city at 6.30 every morning to connect with the Shediac boat at Summerside, and will return on arrival of that boat at Summerside.

THE tug "Gladiator," which left Charlottetown for Pictou on the 12th inst., put into this port yesterday morning. She was, owing to heavy ice, unable to enter Pictou harbor.

CARDINAL McCLOSKEY has been instructed by the Pope to call upon all Irish Catholics to declare in a public document that their case is distinctly separate from that of the secularists.

A FIRE occurred at Bridgetown, Ont., on the 10th inst., which destroyed nearly the whole business portion of the place. The aggregate loss will probably amount to over \$100,000. One or two insurance companies lose heavily.

IN the Senate on Friday last, Sir Alexander Campbell introduced a bill to provide for the construction of branch railways to connect Cape Traverse with the Prince Edward Island Railway, and Cape Tormentine with the Intercolonial.

By a decision of the Board of Health at St. John, persons who have died abroad are not allowed to be brought to that city unless hermetically sealed in a metal coffin. This order has been passed in the interest of the public health, and in order to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.

TWO SEAMEN DROWNED.—The schooner "Chloris," of Yarmouth, which arrived at Halifax on Friday from the Western Banks for bait, reports, on the 3rd ult., two of the crew, named John Delong and Isaiah Innes, while tending their trawls, were drowned. They were both natives of Eel Brook, Yarmouth, N. S., and about twenty years of age.

HANLAN AND ROSS.—Hanlan has postponed his departure from England a week, having had offers to go to Berlin, &c. He has received a telegram from Winnipeg, Man., offering a purse of \$5,000 if the Ross race is held in that place. Ross said to be seriously considering the matter of giving his consent to have the race rowed there. Ross has had a proposition to take charge of a hotel in St. Louis, and says the race with Hanlan will be his last one.

THE Halifax Herald says:—The Lib-Con. journals are cruelly calling attention to the fact that Charlottetown, Summerside and Georgetown, the three places at which Mr. Blake spoke in Prince Edward Island during his missionary tour last summer, have all been carried by the Liberal-conservatives at the recent elections. This is another evidence of the beneficial effects of Mr. Blake's eloquence. The coming elections in Nova Scotia will afford further testimony of the same kind.

MR. DeCosmos, in the House of Commons, on the 12th, called attention to the Chinese question. He read a telegram stating that 24,000 would arrive by August, and said they would soon outnumber the whites and drive the latter out of the Province. Sir John said that no complaint had been made to the Government that white labor was being driven out by Chinese. White labor was scarce and dear on the Pacific Coast that it would be impossible to build the Pacific Railway within the specified time without Chinese labor.

THE Rounding N. Y. Sentinel has reports from the surrounding dairy region showing that the meadows and pastures are largely winter-killed, many being ploughed up because entirely ruined by the repeated frosts and thawing when there was no snow on the ground in winter. The drought of the two weeks past has kept the grass back. Cattle are not turned out yet, and the hay crops will be short. Important dairy interests will suffer. The number of cows in milk is 15 per cent. less than last year, and the flow of milk will necessarily be diminished in greater proportion.

SOMNAMBULISM.—A most singular story is related of a somnambulist, a servant in the employ of Mr. Hyde, of St. Antoine-street, Montreal. Her bedroom is in the third story, and while asleep a few nights ago she arose, made her way through the double window of the bedroom, and was precipitated thirty feet to the pavement. She then arose and staggered along the street, awakening when she reached the corner of Chatham street, a quarter of a mile away. She hurried back to the abode of her mistress, and was admitted. She had been two hours wandering, and was very much bruised. Dr. Gardner found no bones broken and no internal injuries. He cannot account for her fall and absence of serious injury therefrom.
