

Bruins Trip Black Hawks; Hull Fails To Score Again

BOSTON (AP) — Hard hitting Boston Bruins scored two goals in the second period Wednesday night and rookie goalie Jack Norris made them stand up for a 2-1 National Hockey League victory over Chicago Black Hawks.

After a scoreless first period, marked by furious forechecking by the Bruins, Boston broke through Chicago goalie Glenn Hall at 9:36 of the second period.

Johnny Bucyk scored his 23rd goal of the year, taking a shot by Bob Woytowich that went wide of the net and tucking it in the opposite corner before Hall could recover.

Boston scored again at 14:03. Reg Fleming passed the puck in front of the net from the corner and it caromed in off a Chicago defenceman.

Norris had a shutout until two seconds before the final buzzer when Camille Henry scored his 25th goal of the year. The goal resulted from a melee in the Boston end, with Bobby Hull and Bill Hay getting assists.

Norris, who was after his second shutout, was severely tested in the second period when he kicked out 17 shots, four of them by Bobby Hull.

Norris wound up with 33 saves. Hall got 29 in the Chicago net.

Prince Edward Island Rink Loses To Northern Ontario

TORONTO (CP) — A miss by Ontario's Ray Grant early in the match against Lee Green of Calgary allowed Alberta to register a 10-3 victory and take over the lead in the 11-rink round-robin national mixed curling championship here Wednesday.

Grant, trailing 4-3 after four ends, missed a draw to Alberta's shot rock sitting on the back of the four-foot circle ring his last stone of the fifth end. The shot would have given him a tie, but the Unionville sharpshooter was light and the rock died about five feet in front of the house.

It gave Alberta four stones and Green never relinquished the lead.

In other fifth round matches Wednesday afternoon, New Brunswick edged Quebec 8-7, British Columbia defeated Saskatchewan 11-10, Northern Ontario edged Prince Edward Island 8-7 in an extra end and Newfoundland defeated Nova Scotia 10-7.

Manitoba, skipped by defending champion Ernie Boushy of Winnipeg, who sat out the fifth round, was second with a 4-0 won-lost record.

DROPPED ONTARIO
The loss dropped Ontario into third spot with a 3-1 mark.

Nova Scotia, skipped by Charles Piper of Halifax, and British Columbia's Fred Tindling of Vancouver had 3-2 records.

New Brunswick's Brub Peterson of Fredericton and Northern Ontario's Wilf Biron of Sudbury followed with 2-2.

Rinks skipped by Gordon Spicer of Summerside, P.E.I., and Grant Boney of Regina had a lone victory in five starts, while Newfoundland's Dave Pedley of St. John's had a 1-3 record.

The Quebec rink, skipped by Olivier Samson of Quebec City, was winless in all five games.

Alberta gets the bye in the sixth round at 3 p.m. today.

ONTARIO MEETS N.S.
The day's opening round matches Nova Scotia against Ontario, Quebec against Manitoba, Saskatchewan against Northern Ontario, B.C. against Newfoundland, and P.E.I. against New Brunswick.

The seventh round is scheduled for 8 p.m.

Saskatchewan made a big comeback in the fifth round after trailing by 9-3 at the end of six. But British Columbia took advantage of its last shots in the final end to collect two.

New Brunswick broke a 3-3 deadlock in the fifth end with four and was never seriously threatened.

In the only extra-end game of the day, Northern Ontario forced Spicer to make a take-out with his final shot, but the Summerside skip missed the
