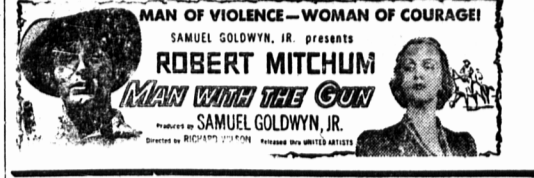

- Measure into bowl
1 cup lukewarm water

2 teaspoons granulated sugar

4. Meantime prepare and combine

1/2 cup finely-crushed cracker crumbs
1/2 cup blanched almonds, finely-ground
1/4 cup granulated sugar
1 slightly-beaten egg
2 tablespoons water
1 1/2 teaspoons almond extract

- Punch down dough. Turn out and halve the dough; set one portion aside to shape later. Roll one portion into a 12-inch square. Spread 1/2 of square with half the crumb mixture. Fold plain third of dough over crumb mixture, then fold remaining third over top—making 3 layers of dough and 2 of filling. Cut rectangle into 18 strips. Twist each strip twice; place on greased cookie sheet. Press 2 or 3 blanch almonds into filling of each twist. Brush with melted butter or margarine; sprinkle with sugar. Shape second portion of dough in same manner. Cover. Let rise until doubled in bulk—about 1 hour. Bake in moderate oven, 350°, 20 to 25 minutes. Yield: 36 twists.
