## S'ide Midgets Defeat Charlottetown Vics 11-6

The Summerside Kinsmen Midgets defeated the Charlottetown Victoria Midgets at Crystal Rink last night by the score of 11 to 6, and will carry a five-goal margin into the second game of a home-and-home series to be played in the North River rink Thursday night. The visitors scored the first goal, but Summerside soon tied it up, forged ahead, and were never again headed. Clive MacDonald was the leading sniper for the victors, getting four goals and one assist. Ron McArthur was second with three goals and one assist, and Everett Gallant had two goals and two assists. Donald Darby, whose play-making at centre ice was a feature of the contest, picked up four assists. The Vics distributed their goals evenly, five players each getting a counter.

## Villemain Wins Close Decision From Gavilan

(By Vic Morris Jr.) MONTREAL, March 20 (CP)—Robert Villemain, France's middle-weight brawler, took a close decision from Cuba's Kid Gavilan here tonight in a 10-round over-weight boxing match before a record indoor crowd estimated at 14,000.

Villemain, a pre-fight six-to-five favorite, entered the ring with a 10 1-2-pound margin over the dusky Cuban who weighed in at 147 1-2. The fight carried a weight top of 158 pounds, set by the Montreal Boxing Commission. It could not be learned immediately what the exact gate or attendance was, but it appeared to be a record crowd for a Montreal indoor fight.

## Sport Echoes From Prince County

What Charlottetown and Summerside hockey fans see at Charlottetown Forum Monday night can hardly be called a doubleheader. Doubleheader would be a more appropriate word. They will see the finish of two hockey matches between St. Dunstan University and Summerside Crystals. Should certainly be worth the price of admission.

The ageing Crystal Rink in Summerside is not going to bow out like "The One-Hoss Shay" after all. It burst an artery Saturday night but the blow was not fatal, and the old rink is functioning better than ever. The ralling at the west end of the rink hasn't been strong for a good many years, the uprights being too tall to the floor and not going through to the lower supports. It has been the custom to keep spectators away from this rail but they crowded against it Saturday night with unexpected results. In the repair job the uprights have been braced much more strongly.

The mishap points dramatically to one thing, however, and that is the crying need for a new hockey rink in Summerside. That a progressive little town like Summerside should go on with such inadequate provision for sports is unthinkable. We are fast becoming the laughing stock of the Island as regards our facilities for playing hockey is concerned. Places like Murray Harbor, Georgetown and North River can build rinks, but a town the size of Summerside is apparently helpless facing this problem. If we have been aiming too high in considering an artificial ice plant then let's build a natural ice rink with provisions for installing the apparatus for artificial ice at a later date.

The St. Dunstan's team had an unmitigated edge on our Crystals Saturday night. They skated faster, and their forward lines moved into attacking formation more rapidly. After some brilliant displays of hockey, the Crystals suffered a slight relapse, though their play was considerably above the form they showed earlier in the season.

Well, we have been raked over the coals by a fellow sports writer of the town, and the writer of "Blue Line Shuffles" have been told off in good style by this "Realm of Sport" person, a good friend of ours, by the way, whose picture lies in the Northumberland Strait a little west of Sea Cow Head. We have been panned for not having greater faith in the ability of the Crystals to bring home the bacon. We have been critical, pointing out the weak spots of this team. Instead of shutting our eyes and chanting "Every day, and in every way, they are getting better and better." We should have called a spade the ace of hearts going through a temporary eclipse, instead of branding it as a shovel.

Personally, we think it is the duty of a sports writer both to applaud and to condemn, to throw bouquets at efforts deserving the flowers, and to heave a brickbat occasionally too, if lack of effort seems to call for it. The Crystals, after a very poor start, have finally snapped out of their lethargy and started to play the kind of hockey we Summerside fans like to see them play. But, who knows whether they have been stung into greater action by the virile comments of the writer of "Blue Line Shuffles" or whether they have responded to the everlasting acclaim of the writer of the "Realm of Sport"? Who knows? A pat on the back if applied too hard and often will sometimes cause a person to stumble, but an energetic lift in the trousers is almost sure to lift him to greater heights.

The writer of "The Realm of Sport" says he "feels it in his bones" that the Summerside Crystals will win the Island crown. We hope his bones are not playing him false. As for us, we never have any luck with that sort of thing. When we have a feeling in our bones it nearly always turns out to be muscular rheumatism, morbus coxarius or housemaid's knee.

## Defeat S'ide Crystals 10-4 Last Night To win Series Two Straight

The A. J. McAdam-coached Saint Dunstan's University pucksters skated their way to the Island Intermediate "A" Hockey League Championship before a wildly cheering crowd of 1,264 hockey fans at the Forum last night when they turned in a terrific third-period scoring spree to send the Summerside Crystals down to a 10-4 defeat and take the best of three series in straight games.

With both teams coming up with one of the smartest and closest matches witnessed this year for two periods, that saw the score deadlocked at 2-2 at the end of the first and still deadlocked at 4-4 at the end of the second, the Saints erupted with a powerful third-period spree that turned an otherwise close contest into a complete rout and rack up six goals without a reply to score a lopsided victory.

For an intermediate game, it was the largest crowd to pack into the Forum this season, and was only surpassed by the Big Four contest between Halifax and Amherst in a playoff game held here last month.

The Saints took the opening game of the series by a 6-4 count, which was started at Summerside last Saturday night, but had to be discontinued when a section of the Crystal Rink boards caved in midway in the third period. The remaining part of the third period in the game was played here last night before the second game of the series started, and the Saints, who were leading by a 6-4 count, held the Crystals scoreless in the extra play here last night to keep their initial win intact, but was a really hectic 10 minutes of hockey.

Lead by the power-packed line of Cliff Bernard, Joe Mahar and Stan Deighen, who accounted for seven of the team's total goals, Mahar chalking up three, and the other two a brace each, the Crystals were skated into the ice in the final session when the Saints turned nothing short of a jet-propelled performance in the final session, to completely disorganize the visiting attack in that frame.

Other goalgetters for Saints were Will Houde and Kiker McIsaac who picked up two and one respectively. Mahar and Bernard also snared four assists each to run their scoring points to seven and six respectively, while Deighen also collected two for four scoring points.

The kid line of Layton Schurman, Benny Grady and Garth Gay were the power behind the Crystal offensive with Schurman coming up with three tallies for a stellar performance while his linemates led him the payoff passes. Gordie Kelly notched up the other Crystal tally on an assist from Syl Bernard.

Hitting a fast clip right from the start of the first period, Saints went in front by two goals, McIsaac garnering the first on a pass from Farmer at 6:14, while Bernard teamed up with Mahar a little over four minutes later to get the second, but they no sooner got their two when Crystals came roaring back to put on the pressure. Layton Schurman broke the ice at 13:24 on a smart attack with Kelly and Gay to cut down the lead, and continuing the pressure, Kelly came up with the equalizer to deadlock the score at 17:46 on an attack with Syl Bernard, to end the scoring for the frame.
