Wholesalers (Continued from Page 1) asked what he thought about these forecasts of rationing, said in an interview Saturday: "No consideration whatsoever has been given by the government to the possibility of rationing butter in Canada and I am firmly convinced that there is not going to be any occasion for doing so." The Prime Minister, it was learned, talked over the situation with Mr. Gardiner Friday, and Saturday the decision was taken to a meeting of agricultural officials to release supplies as an emergency relief measure. Normally, Canada's butter production year starts in May, with big surpluses built up during the summer months used to cover a shortage during the period of low winter production. The government, under its price support program, stocked up surplus of some 40,000,000 pounds last fall, offering producers 68 cents a pound. At the same time imports of butter were kept under government control. No butter can be imported without government permission. For the first time in some years the government entered the winter of 1952-53 with a bigger stockpile than the commercial trade. The government's policy was to keep the price to the consumer stabilized all through the winter. It began selling some of its stocks at 62 cents a pound wholesale and by mid-January had disposed of some 10,000,000 pounds. But on Jan. 26 Mr. Gardiner called on a freeze on all further government butter sales. He feared the possibility that the government, by selling too much of its butter at one time, might lose control over the market, allowing speculators to boost the price to the consumer. Mr. Gardiner recalled the winter of 1951 when the government ran out of butter in March and the price of butter to the consumer jumped 10 and 20 cents a pound.
