**ONLOOKERS DISLIKE IT.**

"Some of the prominent French-Canadians in New England believe that their compatriots in Quebec have made a serious mistake in declaring so pronouncedly for one party when no issue involving their race was at stake.

"They fear it may stir up old animosities which many hoped would remain buried forever, and result not only in injuring the standing of French-Canadians, but seriously damage the Liberal party.

"The blame for the one-sided vote of Quebec is not placed on the voters themselves, but upon J. Israel Tarte and other firebrands whose insincere inflammatory insinuations appear to have been accepted as Gospel truth by the great majority of electors in that province.

"While Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself is recognized as a tolerant man, Canadians here think he should have curbed the tactics of the Quebec managers.

"The entire racial aspect of the campaign is deplored, and the feeling is general that both parties should do all possible to eradicate such controversies and reconnoitre business on a common-sense basis."

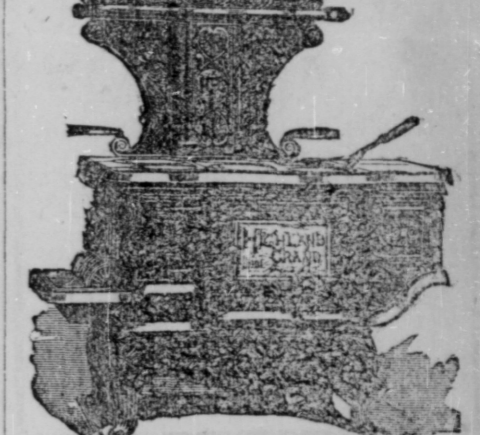
