A CHANCE for CHARLOTTETOWN FIREMEN. Delegates from all the fire companies of Banamath, N. H. voted unanimously on the 24th, to hold a three day's muster there in September. Two thousand invitations to fire companies all over New England and the Middle States and Provinces will be sent out.

MR. RICHARD QUIGLEY, a young man well known here, became crazed from religious excitement one day last week at Boston whither he had gone to work at his trade, and was removed to Danvers Asylum for the insane. Messrs. Stanley & Usher, Printers, with whom Mr. Quigley was engaged say that he did not notice anything wrong with him up to the very time of the sudden attack. This is a very sad case, and we sympathize with the friends of the unfortunate young man.—Summerside Journal.
RUSSIAN finances are apparently in a very bad way. The ordinary expenditure in 1879 was \$5,500,000 roubles, but last year it had increased to 76,250,000. The increase of the expenditure is three millions and a half per annum, and that on account of the debt and a quarter millions. The deficit amounts to eleven millions. Two-thirds of the outlay are on account of the army, the navy, and the debt. The civil administration is suffering badly for lack of funds. National bankruptcy is not far off.
AGRICULTURE.—The New York Herald's special correspondent, Lowell, Mass., says:—"Hanlan and Lee signed articles on Thursday for their race with Haman and Conley. Hanlan changes the date from August 15th to "any date between the above date and the 31st of August." He insists that each party to the race shall mutually agree upon a course. He changes the clause "The course must be named on making second deposit, June 15th," and inserts "six weeks from signing articles." In case the parties do not agree on a referee, Hanlan adds, "the stake holder shall name one."
If the Lieut. Governor's speech at the opening of the Legislature of Manitoba, the attention of the Legislature is invited "to a resolution, having for its object the co-operation of delegates from the Executives of the several Provinces, with a view to suggesting such amendments as experience may show to be necessary to secure the equalization of the general terms upon which the Union of the Provinces was effected, and a clearer definition of the respective jurisdictions of the Federal and Provincial Legislatures than is afforded by the British North America Act or other organic acts."
A VERY strange case of poisoning occurred in the family of Wm. Stewart, of Grand Pre, Kings Co., N. B., on Sunday last. They had greens composed of dandelions and rhubarb tops for dinner on that day, and very soon afterwards were taken violently sick with vomiting and purging. Drs. McLatchey and Chapman were immediately called in and pronounced it a clear case of poisoning by eating the rhubarb tops in the greens. The family, composed of eight children, are all sick and on Thursday morning, they were still very weak and unable to leave their beds, but are now pronounced out of danger.—Yarmouth Times.
The countrywoman who so far forgot herself as to sell her butter on last market day for 22 cents per pound, while some of her neighbors sold, soon after, their butter at 33 cents, bemoaned her hard luck, and complained that she lost a half a dollar in her foolishness to sell at so low a figure. The misfortune of this poor woman was on a par with that of the Jew clothing dealer in an American city. He lived behind his shop, and one day he alarmed his wife by rushing in from the shop, tearing his hair, and exclaiming: "Mine Got! mine Got! I ish ruined! I ish ruined!" "Vot ish the matter mine tear?" said the frightened wife. "Vy, I only asked that tailor-man fifteen dollars, for that suit of clothes, and I might of had twenty-five as well as not." The suit was really only worth half that he got for it, but the tailor had planked down the money at once without attempting to beat down the price asked by the unfortunate Jew.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

PROROGATION OF PARLIAMENT
The Farewell Address to the Marquis and Princess.
OTTAWA, May 26.
Before proroguing Parliament, yesterday, the House of Commons and the Senate presented a farewell address to the Marquis of Lorne and Princess Louise. The Marquis, in expressing thanks on behalf of the Princess, promised to use every effort while at home to promote the interests of the Dominion of Canada. The speech from the Throne was then delivered. It referred to the benefits which would likely result from the sums voted for the public works; the probable large immigration during the coming season to the Northwest, the changes in the militia, customs, and other laws, the benefits which would follow the reduction of duties on goods; the splendid financial position of the Dominion; the probable benefit which would result from the new License Act; and closed by expressing regret at the severance of his official connections with the country, and the belief that the continuance of our British connection would be of much advantage to the Dominion, and praying that the blessing of God may at all times fall upon the people.
The Royal Servants also presented the Princess Louise with an address to which the Marquis on behalf of Her Royal Highness made a suitable reply.

The Pope Gratified.
ROME, May 26.
His Holiness Pope Leo XIII. expresses his gratification respecting the effect of his circular in Ireland.
Telegraph Notes.
The harvest prospects in France are favorable.
Archbishop Croke, on arrival from Rome, was publicly welcomed by the citizens of Limerick.
Prince Jerome Napoleon has returned here from his visit to the ex-Empress Eugenie in England.
The Arctic exploring vessel Sophia, with Prof. Nordenskjold and other scientists on board, has sailed from Gothenburg, for Greenland.
Maro P. Kay, deputy auditor of Alameda county, California, who embezzled \$16,000, was, on the 23rd, sentenced to 14 years imprisonment, the maximum penalty.
A despatch from Port au Prince says: The bombardment of Miragoane has begun and is making havoc among the insurgents. The rest of the republic is reported quiet.
Matthew Arbuckle, the well-known cornet player and orchestral leader, died in New York on the 23rd inst., of pneumonia, aged 54 years. He was a native of Scotland.
Snow fell on the 22nd in Auyago county, Ohio. Small fruit was all killed, and other fruits were badly injured. In Fairfield county, crops were much damaged by washouts.
John Dillon, in a letter to the Dublin Freeman's Journal advises the Irish people to make the Parnell fund such a success that the Pope will realize how grievously he has been deceived by the English Government.
Mr. Trevelyan, Chief Secretary for Ireland, in the House of Commons on the 23rd inst., replying to Joseph Cowen, Radical, declared Davitt, Healy and Quinn could obtain their release any moment by complying with the law.
The Suez Canal Co. have announced that they propose to commence cutting a parallel canal across the Isthmus forthwith. They have applied to the English Government for support in obtaining necessary concession of land from the Khedive.
The Grand Lodge of the World, Independent Order of Good Templars, began its 29th annual session in Chicago, on the 22nd, but engaged only in preliminary work. George B. Katzenstein, of California, Right Worthy Grand Templar, presided at the forenoon session.
Archbishop Croke, replying to an address of welcome presented to him at the Wicklow depot, on the 24th, said it was the Pope's great love for the Irish people that caused him to be so solicitous for their well fare. He was confident that when the Pope understood the situation, the better efforts of the priesthood and of himself for the Irish would be crowned with success. Time would prove the correctness of his representations to the Pope. Meanwhile he urged the people to submit to the Vatican.
A meeting of the Parnellite members of Parliament was held in London on the night of the 24th inst. Justin McCarthy, member of Parliament for Longford, who acted as chairman, said it was the bounden duty of Irishmen to contribute to the testimonial for Parnell. Referring to the papal circular to the Irish clergy, he said the Irish cleric had only to repudiate the fraudulent statements which had been made to the college of cardinals. Mr. Biggar, member of Parliament for Cavan, spoke in condemnation of the circular.
An inquiry is proceeding in Dublin in the murder conspiracy which has been unearthed in the county of Mayo. The first clue to its existence was obtained from a person who was arrested with suspicious papers in his possession. He was then released as a spy in the interest of the police. In this capacity he attended several meetings of conspirators, at which a number of persons were named to be murdered. The assassins were appointed by lots. In furtherance of the plots concocted by conspirators, two farmers were shot and wounded. Six of the plotters have been arrested and are undergoing examination.

By-Law for Levying and Specifying the rate of an Assessment on Real Estate and Incomes in the City of Charlottetown.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:—
1. The rate of Assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1883, and ending 31st December, A. D. 1883, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one cent and one-twentieth of a cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate within the City of Charlottetown, according to the valuation of such Real Estate as assessed by the Assessors of the said City, in their valuation roll of such Real Estate, made and duly returned by them on the sixth day of April A. D. 1883.
2. The rate of Assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1883, and ending 31st day of December, A. D. 1883, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-tenth of a cent on every dollar of the amount of the net yearly incomes, salaries or receipts of all persons, partnerships, and corporations, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City, in their valuation rolls of such Income, made and duly returned by them on the sixth day of April A. D. 1883.
