

S'side Grade Twelve Student Guest Speaker At Rotary Club Luncheon

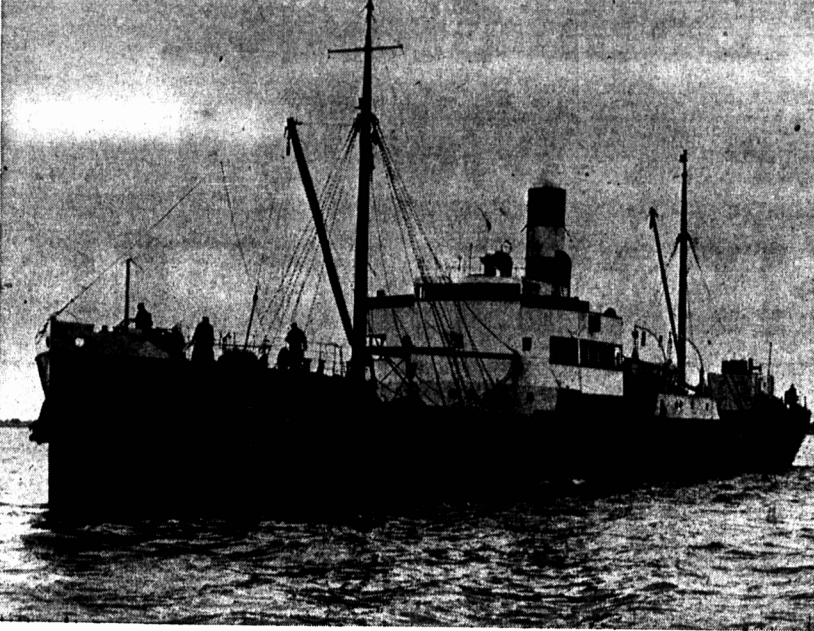
Miss Irene Mountain, a grade twelve student at Summerside High School, was guest speaker yesterday at the regular weekly luncheon of the Summerside Rotary Club, president J. C. (Bud) Mountain presiding.

Miss Mountain, daughter of the club president, addressed the gathering on the activities of the United Nations summer school held in July at Mount Allison University, Sackville, N. B., where she was a representative, under the sponsorship of the Summerside Y's Men's Club.

Miss Mountain stated that there were about 105 students in attendance at the school, which was the first of its kind held in the Maritimes. The first lecture to the student body was given by Mr. Lockwood, assistant professor of education at Mount Allison University, who gave "an historical background of the United Nations", stressing that the problem which rests with us today is to have a world, in which peace, political liberty and justice dominate in every country.

Miss Mountain told the Rotary gathering that the representatives were divided into four groups for discussion periods, with the questions being based on the lectures. Prof. Lockwood led the group each evening in a summary of the days activities, at which a speaker from

The "Irene M" inbound from Newfoundland with a cargo of 20,000 bags of cement for Summerside is seen approaching Holman's wharf yesterday. Truck and trailers from Souris, Montague, Charlottetown and Alberton, as well as from Amherst, Moncton and Saint John were on hand for cement for building and highway construction purposes, as approximately thirty men began the work of unloading which will be completed today. The ship will then sail for a port on the Great Lakes where the balance of her cement cargo, some 30,000 bags, will be unloaded. This is the fifth ship to bring cement from Newfoundland to Summerside this summer, to the Island Portland Cement Company and Maritime Asphalt Products Ltd.

Has No Faith In Current Drive To Sell N. S. Coal

DARTMOUTH, N. S. (CP)—Clare Gillis said Tuesday night that the Nova Scotia coal industry is in a "chaotic mess" and could be eliminated overnight by the advent of industrial atomic energy.

The CCF member of Parliament for Cape Breton South told a press conference that "personally I have never had any faith" in the current industry-government-union campaign to sell Nova Scotia coal.

He said the current marketing problems of the Nova Scotia coal industry could be traced to the "lack of any kind of a sales policy over the last few years."

He said that since 1942 the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation has been the biggest single importer of United States coal into Canada through its wholly subsidiary the Dominion Import Company of Montreal.

Mr. Gillis regarded as immediate threats to the survival of the industry the extension of natural gas pipelines from western to eastern Canada and the possible introduction of atomic energy into industry.

He proposed that a federal fuels board with regulatory powers be established to ensure a fair share of the available markets to all phases of the Canadian fuel industry.

Western Farmers Plan New Appeals For Federal Aid

EDMONTON, (CP)—Fresh appeals to Ottawa for financial aid to farmers because of the grain-marketing emergency will be made by a delegation from the western farm unions.

Henry G. Young, president of the Farmers' Union of Alberta, said Tuesday arrangements are being made for a delegation to be in Ottawa Oct. 20 to make representations to federal ministers or their deputies.

The delegation also will urge an interim payment on the 1953 wheat crop, a floor price on cattle marketings and maintenance of the floor price on hogs.

World's Biggest Tanker On Trial Run

HAMBURG, Germany (Reuters)—The world's biggest tanker, the 47,000-ton Al-Malik Saud Al-Awal King Saud I, sailed from her fitting-out berth at the Howaldt shipyard Tuesday for her first trial trip. The tanker, which the builders say can carry as much oil as a freight train 25 miles long, was built for Greek-born shipping millionaire Aristotle Sokratis.

Consider Action In Wake of Recent Report On Vice Conditions In Montreal

MONTREAL (CP)—Two meetings of Montreal's seven-man executive committee were held Tuesday to discuss what action should be taken in the wake of Mr. Justice Francois Caron's report on vice conditions in the city.

There were no immediate announcements from the meetings, but chairman J. O. Aselin said he expects something concrete will result.

On the agenda was the question of what the executive should do about the case of J. Albert Langlois, dismissed as chief of police by Mr. Justice Caron for tolerating commercialized vice in the city.

Mr. Langlois was one of 20 members and former members of the police department convicted by Mr. Justice Caron of tolerating prostitution, betting and gambling in the city between 1941 and 1950. Mr. Langlois immediately appealed the conviction.

He had been asked by J. O. Aselin, chairman of the executive committee, to take over in the absence of Mr. Langlois.

However, Tuesday's police department orders of the day bore the signature of assistant director Alfred Belanger, "for J. A. Langlois, director of police."

Meantime, the Montreal Police-men's Brotherhood urged reorganization of the police force in the wake of Mr. Justice Caron's report.

The Brotherhood whose membership includes most of the city's police and detectives said in a statement that reorganization of the force should be accompanied by removal of political influence in departmental promotions. There should be an attempt to do a clear-cut code letting every policeman know what his individual responsibilities and duties are.

GIVES INTERVIEW

In an interview Tuesday, Mr. Langlois said that he will return to his office Thursday to resume full charge of the police department. He said that by that time his appeal proceedings will have been completed.

He said he is certain of vindication on appeal.

SPECULATE ON ACTION

There was some speculation that the executive committee would ask Mr. Langlois to remain away from his office pending action on his appeal.
